

ELECT 4 TEACHERS

SCHOOL BOARD AUTHORIZES PURCHASE OF SUPPLIES

Four more teachers were elected by the Salem school board at their meeting last night, to fill vacancies in the grade school staff.

Those elected were Marie B. Westhoff, graduate of Monmouth normal school; Sarah E. Atwood, who taught at Klamath Falls last year; Eva Beatty, former McIntire teacher, and Margaret Huns, of Silverton.

Caroline Hrubetz, science teacher in the Salem high school, tendered her resignation to the board, saying that she had decided to continue her studies during the coming winter, at Columbia university, where she has been taking summer school work.

Resignations were also received and accepted from May F. Bolter, Parrish teacher, and Mr. and Mrs. Walter Welton. Mrs. Welton has been a teacher in the Highland school, while Mr. Welton has been physical director of McKinley Junior high. He has accepted a position as director of religious education in Tacoma.

Action in regard to the janitors of the Salem school system was taken, with the re-election of most of the present staff. Changes were made as follows: C. C. Birdwell was elected to Parrish in place of J. T. Burch, who is to be janitor at Washington school, and J. W. Pratt and H. A. Wright were elected to Lincoln school.

Superintendent George W. Hug was authorized to purchase necessary supplies for the science department, including six new microscopes, at a discount for payment within 30 days.

The building committee of the board was empowered to remodel the barn on the Leslie junior high school grounds, so that it can be used as a manual training shop there. The same committee is to consider granting a greater allowance for the hauling expenses incurred by the headjanitor in delivering supplies to the buildings.

MRS. STANSBERRY DIES AT MONMOUTH

MONMOUTH, N. J., July 26.—(Special.)—Mrs. Mary E. Stansberry, resident of Independence since 1893, died at Monmouth on the evening of July 25, at the age of 82 years, after a lingering illness.

Some time ago, Mrs. Stansberry became involved in an altercation with her two children, Mrs. Hattie Hewitt, of Montezano, Wash., and J. E. Stansberry, of Pendleton, and is said to have suffered physical violence at their hands at that time.

Just before her death, the county court here ordered property restored to her which it was said was obtained from her by duress.

Mrs. Stansberry was born at Orange City, Indiana, May 12, 1845, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Freeman Wright. During the Civil war she saw many of the hardships of the time.

She was married to Allen W. Stansberry, a Civil war veteran, on September 28, 1865, and of this union six children were born, the two named above being the only ones surviving.

Mr. and Mrs. Stansberry came to Oregon in 1871, locating in Portland at first, and later moving to Independence, where Mr. Stansberry died some years ago.

Mrs. Stansberry was a member of the Methodist Episcopal church, the Women's Relief corps, and Neighbors of Woodcraft.

The remains are at the Keeney funeral home, and funeral services will be held Wednesday, July 27, at 2 p. m. from the Methodist church. Rev. Howard W. Moffat, pastor of the church, will officiate. Interment will be in the K. of P. cemetery south of Monmouth.
