

BOBBY GRAY SPONGE AT TAKING WALLOPS

Alternately countering and leading, Ad Mackie last night poured punishment into Bobby Gray, Mt. Angel miracle man, with the only result that the Portland boy took the decision.

If Salem fans had any curiosity as to the punishment one man could absorb with a smile and an occasional kick-back, they found out that Bobby Gray takes plenty and stays on his feet.

No need to go into the army main event round for round. The first two rounds were even, the third went to Gray when he tried to do a Dempsey, and all the other cantos belong to Ad Mackie.

In the fourth round Mackie opened up with left and right counters and sent Bobby down without count.

From the fourth frame on Bobby Gray showed that he had stamina enough for a half dozen men for Mackie kept hitting chin and body blows hard and often. Bobby knelt down for a count of nine in the seventh round and in the ninth took 12 straight rights to the face without faltering.

Gray rallied in the tenth but had no strength and could not get to Mackie who had tired himself in his furious effort to knock down his India rubber opponent.

Mackie showed to advantage, weighing 126 pounds to Gray's 126½. Last night was one of Mackie's best showings here but it was impossible to knock out the Mt. Angel shock absorber.

Gray is certainly a good match for Phil Bayes while Mackie would be an excellent drawing card with Frankie Britt, of Tacoma, or with any other good lad in his weight.

Joe Jewett of Portland made good with the Salem fans last night when he knocked out "Red" Hayes of Stayton in the fourth canto of a scheduled six round semi-final. There was plenty of stugging in this fight from start to finish, with "Red" going down without count in the first round. Joe was wild but vicious and in the third he followed his second's instructions to the letter, hitting as directed and sending "Red" down for a flash. After 80 seconds of mean slugging, Hayes took the final count after absorbing a left to the chin and a short right to the body.

Teddy Fox vs a mud turtle, best describes the independence lad's four round decision over Salem Paddy Ferguson. Ferguson was game and would probably put up a good fight with a slaver boy, but Fox's fierce and fast style drove Ferguson into an armadillo crouch which he maintained until convinced that the last round was over. Fox is getting into good shape and should show here again with a faster, gamier lad.

Oh boy! That third preliminary, St. Fluke, 110 pounds, of Mill City, against Raymond Schneider, 108 pounds, of Monitor. This could only be called a draw. Fluke had been matched with Harry Lee, Portland Chinese

Ind, but Lee was hard to find and Schneider was substituted. This fight was a whiz from the bell with St. down in the first round. Schneider continued to hit and land at will but Fluke started in doing likewise and the result was one of the fastest little slugging matches ever seen here.

The fight was over within 70 seconds in the first prelim when Eddie Graham of Salem was KO'd by Danny Moore of Independence. Graham and Moore started in even but Moore showed that he is a go-ketter.

The special event, pulled as a surprise curtain raiser, was a volunteer exhibition that pleased and amused the fans. Wayne Shesler, Salem youngster, took a four round decision from Jimmie Espinville, Salem Filipino, who has a Marshal Wilder crouch. This was a laugh and a boost for Shesler who is out to win.

Last night's crowd was a fair turnout. The card merited a fair house and was certainly a winner throughout.

Ralph Mason refereed in place of Tom Loutitt who was suddenly called to Seattle. Mason's work was excellent and received little abuse when it is considered that "a prophet is little honored in his home town."

One of the surprises of the evening was the unusually large attendance of ladies. The local fights have been attracting more women and a record breaking turnout is expected for the next show.

NEW YORK CHANCES FOR BIG BOUT SLIM

NEW YORK, July 27.—(AP)—Before leaving late today for Chicago, probable scene of Gene Tunney's heavyweight title defense against Jack Dempsey this fall, Tex Rickard dealt what appeared to be a final blow to New York's chances of staging the season's fistful plum.

Although Rickard declared he will not know for at least two days where the fight will take place, he completely overruled the suggestion of Charles A. Stoneham, president of the New York Giants, that the Polo Grounds here offered a site large enough to accommodate a \$2,000,000 house at \$50 top.

Stoneham's statement, which in effect offered the promoter use of the grounds, was "made in fairness to the press and all lovers of boxing," as proof that there is a "place in New York City large enough to warrant Rickard's conducting the proposed Tunney-Dempsey contest here at a profit to the promoter."

It was pointed out by business and political interests that Rickard gained a sizeable profit from the heavyweight elimination tournament and that undoubtedly pressure would be brought to bear to stage the final of the series before the same fans who patronized the earlier matches.

Nevertheless, Rickard apparently eliminated New York from consideration when he declared that he was "more concerned with the seating capacity than the top price," for seats at the September renewal of last fall's record breaking struggle.

"What I want is an arena seating 125,000 or more spectators and New York has none of that sort," Rickard declared. "Chicago offers that and so does Philadelphia and in both cities top price seats can be sold for \$50 in comparison with the \$25 maximum here. But my mind is still open and I won't know definitely where the fight will take place until I return from Chicago."

WESTERN STARS WIN FROM SOUTH

NEW YORK, July 27.—(AP)—Rising young tennis stars of west and south met today in the third round of the metropolitan turf court championship and the west won in a hard fought three set match.

John Doeg, 17, of Santa Monica, Cal., youngest player ever selected for the Davis cup defenders, downed the diminutive Bryan Grant, Jr., also 17, of Atlanta, Ga., winner of the southern men's title two weeks ago 6-8, 6-4, 7-5. Doeg thus entered the quarter finals where tomorrow he meets Watson M. Washburn of New York, veteran Davis cup defender.

After the match Doeg paired with Bobby Sellers, fellow Californian to win in the opening round of the New York state sectional doubles.
