

No-hit, No-run Game Gives Postoffice Title

PEP CO. DEFEATED BY 10 TO 0 SCORE

No-hit, no-run pitching—that was the final answer, just as conclusive as President Coolidge's "No" to the question of supremacy in the industrial twilight league in the final game Tuesday night. Ben Rider of the Postoffice team pitched the no-hit, no-run game, and naturally the Postoffice won, for along with Rider's batout delivery, the letter carriers turned eight hits and the P. E. P. team's three errors and other shortcomings into ten runs.

It was a pitcher's battle up to the third, and then turned into a slaughter quite similar to the one, also in the third inning, that the Valley Motor perpetrated on the Papermakers the night before, but it stopped at six runs.

Gibson of the Postoffice started the fireworks with a hot single to right field. Price walked and O'Neill advanced the two runners on a fielder's choice. Collins drew a base on balls, intoxicating the sacks, and then G. Thompson was hit by one of Merriott's offerings and Gibson's substitute runner, Fisher, trotted home.

Fisher immediately picked up the bat and pounded a grounder to Arnold, who fielded it so deep that he couldn't decide where to throw it. Price scored, everybody safe.

Teed, PEP catcher, made a heroic effort to catch O'Neill off third, and the ball sailed far into left field while O'Neill and Collins started the rubber.

Rider struck out but reached first when the catcher let the ball slip through his hands. K. Thompson also fanned. Taylor doubled to right field, and two more runners crossed the plate. Gibson, who had started all the fireworks, ended the same by grounding out to second.

The Postoffice made three more runs in the fourth and one in the fifth, but a detailed account would be burdensome. The real feature of the game was the speed and effectiveness of the youthful Rider, who would look over his horn plums and then loose a baffling twister that had the opposition hopping out and grounding out continually, even though he struck out only four men. O'Neill made a spectacular catch of a Texas leaguer in the fifth, and converted it into a double play.

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TEX STRIKES SNAGS IN BIG BOUT PLANS

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From Los Angeles came the statement from Dempsey that he could not be ready to fight until after Sept. 26. Getz, in his application named Sept. 15 as the date for the fight with the 22nd as the alternative date and with the prospect that the contest would be decided on the latter date.

Dempsey, from Los Angeles, said he could not be ready to meet Tunney until some day after the 26th due to conditions which he could not foresee at the time he was in New York to box Jack Sharkey. He said the condition of his wife, the former Estelle Taylor, made it necessary to hold the match after Sept. 26, that he might have ample time for preparation.

The other disquieting note came from the New York athletic commission which held its regular meeting today. The New York commission hinted it might take some action intended to prevent Rickard from holding the fight in Chicago, in making its announcement that "We have nothing to say—now."

Rickard left for New York this afternoon apparently satisfied that Dempsey would agree to the Sept. 22 date. He wired Dempsey that conditions would prevent staging the match later than the 25th.

"It is impossible to postpone the fight until after the 26th. Dempsey will have to fight on the 22nd, that's all."

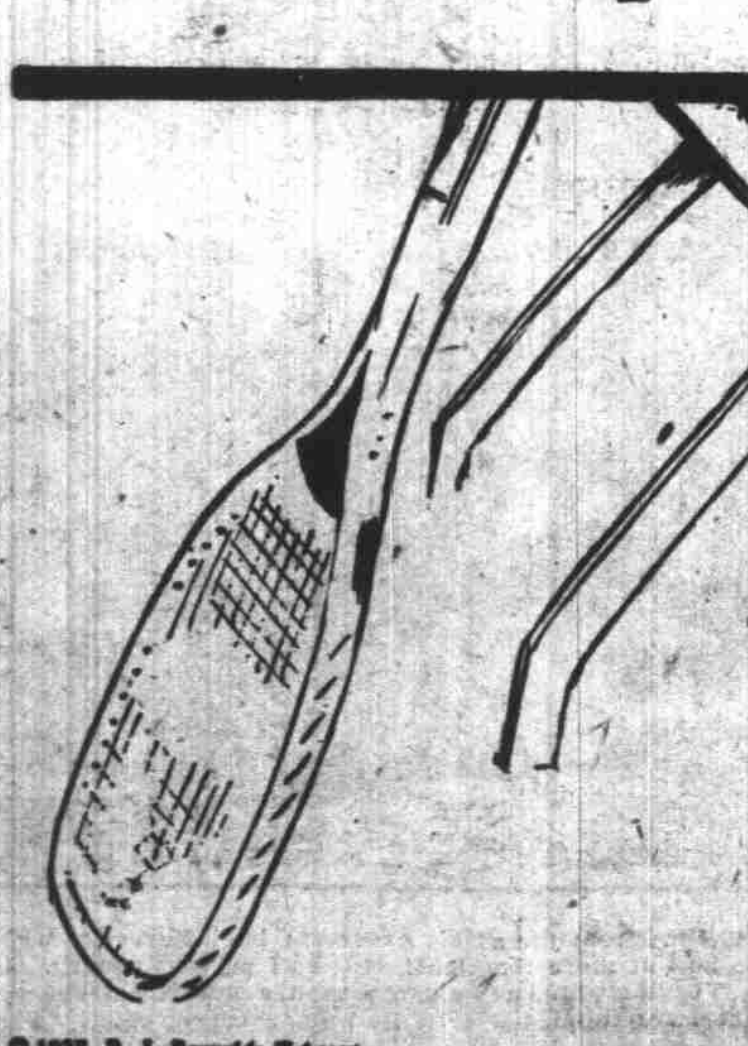
