# PLAN FIVE RESIDENCES

# DISTANCE RECORD FOR DISTRICT SET

Allan Canfield, riding a new, 1928 "Fore-Whel" brake model Single, Harley Davidson, fresh from Harry Scott's stock of new motorcycles, rode an actual distance of 40.3 miles on a single quart of gasoline, setting the highest official record for mileage on a gallon basis ever obtained in this district for a motor vehicle.

Canfield, a Statesman reporter and the only local entrant in the second international newspapermen's motorcycle derby under the auspices of the Harley Davidson motorcycle company, was accompanied in this record breaking run by State Traffic Officer Ray C. Abet and Newell Williams, official observer, and Harry Scott, local Harley dealer.

In the presence of the observers, Officer Abet and Williams placed one standard quart of gasoline in the fuel tank, and sealed it up. The machine was then run under its own power, from an auxiliary tank, to the fairgrounds, where the auxiliary tank was sealed, and the motor run until the carburetor, a regular De Luxe Schebler model, was entirely dry.

The first tank, containing a quart of ordinary Richfield gas was then unsealed, the supply turned into the carburetor, the machine started. The route covered included the run to Hubbard and return to the fairgrounds north of Salem, and thence east on the Silverton highway until the gasoline supply was entirely ex-
