IMPROPER LICENSES COST OREGON MUCH

PORTLAND, Aug. 9.—(AP)—Half a million dollars is lost to the state of Oregon each year through use of improper licenses by some of its motorist citizens, said Captain Frank Ervin, of the police traffic division, here today.

The amount was said by Mr. Ervin to be a conservative estimate of the amount defrauded from the potential revenue by reason of violation of the automobile license law. He declared that twenty five thousand automobiles in Oregon, owned by permanent residents, bear foreign license plates.

Since the Oregon license range from \$15 to \$37 for passenger cars, and since neighboring states have much lower fees, plus a personal property tax, unscrupulous Oregon motorists, through friends in other states, obtain foreign license plates and register fictitious addresses in the other states. Since they are not on the tax rolls of the other state they evade the personal property tax.

State, county and municipal authorities are making every effort to weed out the twenty five thousand drivers, Ervin said. In Portland last year 200 convictions were obtained of permanent residents who were driving cars with foreign license plates.

"Oregon is abused perhaps more than any other state in the Union by this form of fraud," Captain Ervin said.

"Oregon's license fee is what it is because of the necessity of completing the highways program of the state. Our highways already bring millions of dollars to the state in tourist revenues. Our completed highway program will increase the state's prosperity. Citizens of Oregon who have the future of Oregon in their minds and hearts pay the automobile license fee here willingly knowing that it goes for improvement of the highway system which in turn brings return on the money spent for license."

SEEK ELIMINATION OF LIQUOR SCENES

Anti Saloon Leaguers will Go After Violators of Hayes' Edict

WESTERVILLE, O., Aug. 9. (Special)—Officials of the national Anti Saloon league with headquarters here announced today that they will begin a campaign at once looking to the elimination of drinking scenes and other wet propaganda from moving pictures made and exhibited in the United States.

The announcement followed receipt by the league of a letter from Will H. Hayes, the "Judge Landis" of the movies, in which he said, "It is the earnest purpose of the Motion Picture Producers and Exhibitors' association of America, of which I am president, to make certain that the screen shall never be used in a

manner which promotes disrespect for any law, whatever that law may be."

Mr. Hayes' letter stated that it is the purpose of the association to make certain "that into no picture there be allowed to enter any shot of drinking scene, manufacture or sale of liquor, or under effects of liquor which are not a necessary part of the story."

League officials, the announcement said, will make a check-up of moving pictures shown in every state and will point out to Mr. Hayes instances believed to be wet propaganda. Church members throughout the country will be asked to co-operate by reporting such instances.

"Many pictures, especially Western pictures, legitimately show scenes of bar-room and dance hall days," said the statement, "and to these we can take little exception. The old bar-room, with their dancing girls and gambling paraphernalia, played an important part in the early history of the West. What we do take exception to are the cheap sex movies, in which the principals pour a drink or shake a cocktail every time they turn around. This is the kind of propaganda which has been insistent and which we will try

to stop with the cooperation of Mr. Hayes and his organization."
