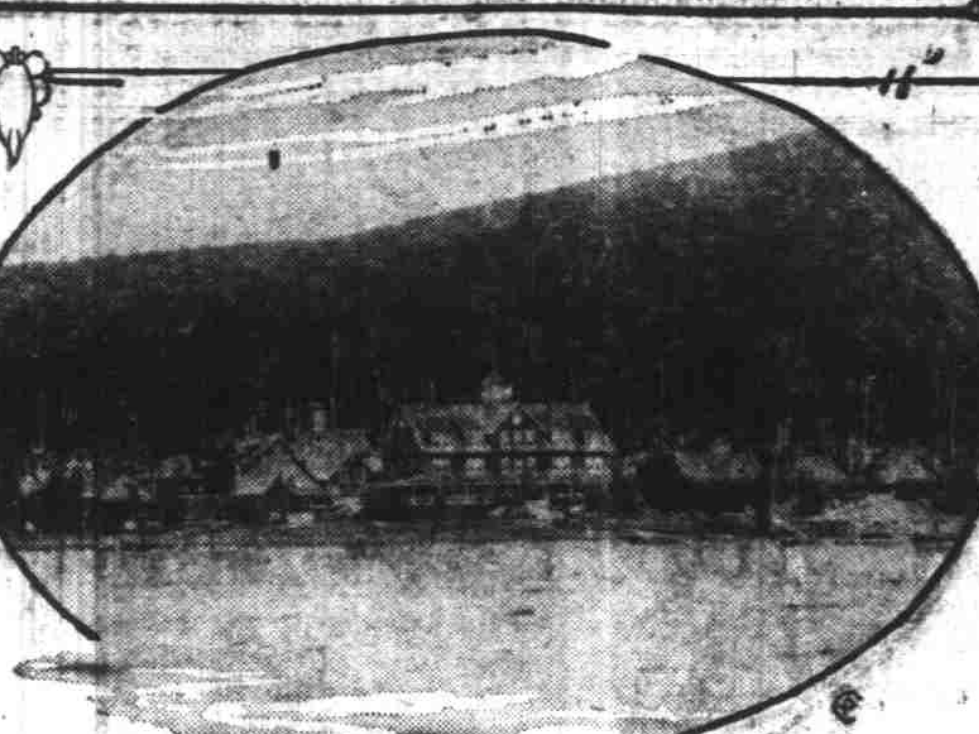
## Dr. McCormick in Paris

## SECRECY NECESSARY

## Open Negotiations Between Nations Impossible

WILLIAMSTOWN, MASS., Aug. 9. (AP)—Secret negotiations, but not secret agreements, were upheld by Sir Arthur Willert, head of the news bureau of the British foreign office, Monday in an address at the Institute of Politics.

Geneva has come to be very much of a club for foreign ministers, he said, where representatives of various countries can meet and quietly discuss controversial problems.

"The private comings and goings at Geneva are, I know," said Sir Arthur, "frowned on by some supporters of the league on the ground that they make for secret diplomacy. To this criticism my answer is a simple and, I venture to think, a practical one.

"International negotiations, to succeed, must be secret up to a certain point. Diplomats charged with questions in which national

armor proper is often involved cannot afford to do all their work in the presence of the public. It is easier to be frank and what is still more important, it is easier to make concessions and meet the other side half way in private than it is in open conference when controversy and concession are flashed to the press of the countries concerned, and sometimes, it is to be feared, distorted."

## FLOGGERS SENTENCED

## Alabama Convictions of Masked Assaulters Sets Precedent

ONEONTA, Ala., Aug. 9. (AP)—With the sentencing Monday of the last of seven men who participated in the recent flogging of Jefferson Galloway, a young farmer, a precedent of far reaching interest among residents of Alabama was set. Until this series of cases came to trial no one had been convicted in this state of charges growing out of masked floggings.

Today's five principals entered pleas of guilty to taking part in the whipping and were fined \$500 each and sentenced to serve six months in jail.

## EVANGELICAL FOLK TO ENCAMP TODAY

## Conference Women's Society Will Have Charge of Two Day Program

The annual encampment of the Evangelical church for Oregon and western Washington will be held Aug. 10th to 25th at the Jennings lodge camp ground three miles north of Oregon City on the banks of the Willamette river, according to an announcement here yesterday.

The Women's Missionary society of the conference will be in charge of the program for the first two days. Mrs. C. C. Poling is the president of this organization.

Sunday, August 14th, Rev. G. L. Lovell, Rev. E. C. Kretlow, and Rev. E. W. Practoreus will be the speakers.

Monday, August 15th, a ten day course of preparation for Christian work will be put on, as well as a Bible study course. The afternoons and evenings will be conducted by Rev. Practoreus, evangelistic and the service will be assisted by Rev. Poling, Rev. Lovell, Rev. Gates, Rev. Plummer, Rev. Abie, Rev. Erskin, and Rev. Culver.

The camp ground at the lodge is splendidly equipped for gatherings of this kind, it is said. A modern commodious tabernacle was erected last year at a cost of about \$13,000. It will seat 1800 people.

On account of the encampment, there will be no services at the local church August 21st, and only Sunday school and one preaching service will be held August 14th.

Andrew Mellon in Italy
