According to a study made by the organization which Mr. Epstein represents, there are at least 1,800,000 aged persons in the United States who are dependent upon relatives or public or private relief for their support. The association condemns the poorhouse as being antiquated and tremendously costly. "A Pennsylvania commission on old age assistance showed that for the cost of an inmate in a county almshouse in that state, three persons could be supported in their own homes," declares the association's report. While virtually every civilized country has already adopted some form of old age insurance or pen-
