Richard Wagner Honored in Film Being Prepared

BERLIN, (AP)—A film entitled "Richard Wagner and 50 Years of Bayreuth" is being prepared simultaneously at Leipzig, Bayreuth and Munich under the management of Film Director Firmann. It will be brought out this year. The foremost Wagner historians have collaborated in the writing of the scenario, which also calls for the inclusion of the opera performances at the coming Bayreuth festival.

For the production and promulgation of the film a special syndicate has been formed comprising Siegfried Wagner, prominent musical professors and Wagner biographers from all parts of Germany, the director of the Leipzig Conservatory, Professor Max Paur, and many notables of Leipzig, Bayreuth and Munich.

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
