HEALTH SERIES OPENS TUESDAY FOR FIVE DAYS

Physicians and Nurses from All Parts of State to Gather Here

MATERNITY TO BE TOPIC

Effort to Combat High Death Rate on West Coast to be Made; County Demonstration to Take Active Part

Beginning a five day series of meetings which will bring to Salem several hundred doctors and nurses, the second annual institutes for physicians and nurses will be held in Salem Tuesday and Wednesday, August 30 and 31, with headquarters at the offices of the Marion county health demonstration.

"The institutes this year are to concentrate on prenatal, postnatal, and obstetrical services," said officials at the health demonstration office yesterday. "A study has shown that the death rate in maternity cases is greater on the west coast than in the United States as a whole. The two institutes, for nurses and for physicians, which run concurrently, have been planned this year to help meet the needs of these groups in this important field."

Infant Deaths Few

"The infant death rate, on the other hand is lower here than in the United States as a whole. In Marion county, we find that the largest number of infant deaths occur in the first month of life. So we are finding the topics of the institutes to be of tremendous interest to medical men, and all over the state."

"These two institutes are being brought to Salem through the cooperation of the Marion county child health demonstration with the state board of health, University of Oregon medical school, Oregon State Graduate Nurses' association, Oregon League of Nursing Education, Oregon Bureau of Public Health Nursing and Child Hygiene, Oregon Organization for

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HOLD LAST PARK SERVICES TODAY

REV. NORMAN K. TULLY TO SPEAK AT WILLSON PARK

Attendance and Interest This Year Exceptional, Say Folk in Charge

Previous to coming to Salem two years ago, Dr. Tully served as the pastor of the large Presbyterian church in Racine, Wis. He was already favorably known locally because of his work for several years as assistant to Dr. Harold Leonard Bowman, pastor of the First Presbyterian church, previous to his acceptance of the Racine pulpit position. At one time, also, Dr. Tully served as religious work director of the Minneapolis Y. M. C. A.

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20,000 THRILLED AT HUGE CIRCUS

MONSTER SPECTACLE MOVES IN AND OUT OF CITY

Features Among Best Ever Seen Here; Midget Born in Salem, Learned.

The circus came—and is gone. Some 20,000 Salem and Marion county people visited the big tent yesterday during the two performances, were properly thrilled, and went away glad to have seen the "greatest show on earth."

Just as stealthily as it had come, the big tent show, with its 1600 people, 900 horses, and menagerie of 1000 animals, departed. The process of dismantling the canvas began even before the final performance was ended. In the short space of two hours, the wagons had been loaded onto the train of four sections, and the long rail journey to Chico, California, the next stop had begun.

A goodly part of the urchin element which had constituted the chief welcoming committee yesterday morning, and had carried water to the elephants for admission tickets, were interested spectators of the dismantling process, but this time, the little fellows were accompanied by groups of their elders, equally interested.

Jim Whalen, boss canvasser, familiarly known as "The Whale," directed the operations which were carried out with an ease and a dispatch worthy of an army camp. Tom Lynch, wagonmaster, marshaled his drivers. Under these two men, a multitude of workers soon had the Parrish junior high school field bare of circus appurtenances.

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FOREST FIRE PERSISTS

Two Families Still Endangered by Flames Near Eugene

EUGENE, Aug. 27.—(AP)—Two families composed of ten persons were still hemmed in by the forest fire at the mouth of Nelson creek, according to a report reaching here late today.

The flames are reported to be burning close around the M. N. Keck home and the Mrs. Wilcutt home. The fire is burning on both sides of the road leading to these homes and efforts to reach the families have failed it is reported.

The telephone line to these houses has been broken and no word as to the safety of two families has been received.

Forest fire fighters, pumping water with gasoline engines, saved the barn of Hess Porter on upper Nelson creek when it caught fire from sparks. The blaze is reported to be a sheet of flame and falling trees are scattering sparks over adjacent timbered areas.

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RADICALS' RITES TODAY

All Boston Policemen Ordered on Duty to Prevent Disorder

BOSTON, Aug. 27.—(AP)—Superintendent Michael H. Crowley of the Boston police today ordered every policeman on the force on duty for tomorrow, when the funeral of Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti are to be held but indicated that he did not expect any disorder.

"I believe," he said, "this will be a perfectly orderly funeral procession and as such it will be given protection to the fullest extent by the police."

Altering their previous plans for an elaborate procession with a band from the north end Italian quarter to the crematory at Forest Hills, the Sacco-Vanzetti defense committee announced that the hearse will be followed by no more than two hundred mourners.

THIS MUST NOT BE TOLERATED

A citizen and taxpayer of Salem was employed on a contract duly made to do a piece of public work. He started the work—

And then he was told that he must not go on with it, because the members of a certain labor union objected.

This must not be tolerated. It is not fair. It is not American. It is Russian; radical; intolerable.

It would be as intolerable if he were told he could not go on because he was a card man in a labor union, or a member of the Quaker or Baptist or Catholic church.

Salem is American. It must remain American. It must not be sovietized. Intolerance is intolerable here.

No man must be allowed to tell any other man that he cannot work, because of his affiliations or his refusal to affiliate, any more than because of his political or religious belief, or his refusal to believe.

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FEAR FOR FATE OF U. S. MINERS STILL PERSISTS

Communications from Mexico Indicate Uncertainty as to Plight

NO EVIDENCE OF LAXITY

President Calls Personally Orders Protection of American Lives Says Report; Embassy to Watch Results

WASHINGTON, Aug. 27.—(AP)—Uncertainty continued today at the state department as to the plight of 18 Americans reported besieged Thursday in their homes at the Amparo mines in Mexico when the mining properties were seized by radicals.

A telegram, dated 1 p. m. yesterday, from Consul Satterwhite at Guadalupe, informed the department that telegraphic advices from Amparo were that no Mexican troops, either federal or state, had appeared on the scene up to yesterday morning. The governor of the state of Jalisco, however, was expected.

Assurances Given

This report contrasted with assurances given yesterday to the American charge d'affaires by the Mexican acting foreign minister to the effect that the military had matters in hand and that the "situation" of the Americans at Amparo was "satisfactory."

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SHIP SEARCH CONTINUED

Cruiser and 6 Destroyers Scrutinize Sea on Way to Hawaii

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 27.—(AP)—The tragic aftermath of the air race from California to Hawaii was reflected in vivid contrast today by the Pacific naval search for the seven missing fliers and planning on their memorial services here.

Naval officials were fulfilling their program to continue the search until "every hope is exhausted."

The light cruiser Omaha and six destroyers plowed slowly along the great circle toward Hawaii, scanning the remaining bit of uncovered area. They were expected to arrive at Pearl Harbor Monday, refuel and return to San Diego, still searching.

Submarines stationed at Pearl Harbor, accompanied by their tenders, were skirting the shore of the island group. They were expected to be through soon.

While these efforts were exerted to cover every chance of a rescue, memorial plans formulated in San Francisco gained momentum. Mayor James Rolph, Jr., of San Francisco, announced today he would appoint a committee on Monday to represent the city.

LEE CHOSEN PRESIDENT

Local Man to Head Loan Association; Salem Gets Convention

PORTLAND, AUG. 27.—(AP)—Features of a preliminary session to the Pacific states conference of Savings and Loan associations which will open a conference tomorrow, was the election of A. A. Lee, Salem, president; Judge John C. Kendall, Marshfield, first vice president; J. V. Whipp, Portland, second vice president and J. R. Gallahan, Portland, secretary-treasurer of the Oregon State League of Savings and Loan associations.

Salem was chosen for next year's state convention, and Lee was named delegate to the 1928 national convention at Dallas, Texas.

HEADLESS BODY FOUND

Victim of Murderers at Flushing Identified by Widow

NEW YORK, Aug. 27.—(AP)—The nude and headless body of a man found in a lonely thicket in Flushing was identified today as that of James Marmaro of Ozone Park, Queens by his day as that of James Marmaro morgue officials announced. Marmaro has been missing from his home since Monday.

Motive for the killing appeared obscure to the police.

FRANCE ASSURES LEGION SAFETY

NO DEMONSTRATIONS EXPECTED AT CONVENTION

Million French Comrades Said Ready to Protect Members of A. E. F.

CHICAGO, Aug. 27.—(AP)—A million French comrades in arms are ready to protect members of the American Legion from possible outbreaks of Sacco-Vanzetti sympathizers in France during the coming convention, Maurice Bokanowski, French minister of commerce and aviation advised today.

M. Bokanowski, who was in Chicago today as the guest of Vice President Charles G. Dawes and members of the French colony, said that France was preparing a warm welcome for the Legionnaires and that everything would be done to prevent attacks and insults.

"I do not anticipate any serious trouble, however, although Paris, like any other metropolitan center, includes among its people thousands of radical sympathizers," he explained.

As a means of proving its friendship for the former American doughboys, a national holiday will be proclaimed the day of the parade and a special postage stamp and Lafayette on opposite sides and linked with an airplane picture commemorative of Lindbergh's trans-Atlantic flight, will be issued for the fifteen days of the convention.

STORM TAKES 33 LIVES

Tempest in Nova Scotia and New Foundland Damages Heavily

ST. JOHN'S, N. F., AUG. 27.—(AP)—Thirty three lives lost and property damage that probably will total more than \$150,000 was the toll counted today from Thursday's great storm in Newfoundland.

The possibility that the death list and property damage figures may mount much higher was seen in the fact that scores of coastal communities were still cut off from outside communication tonight due to destroyed telegraph lines.

Five fishing schooners went down with all hands, and eleven others were known to have been destroyed with their crews coming off safely.

Grave fears are felt here that the Grand Banks fishing fleet suffered heavily, but no authentic reports have been received yet.

SAILORS SWIM FOR LIFE

Fear Explosion on Patrol Boat, But Fire Extinguished

BALTIMORE, MD., Aug. 27.—(AP)—Seven members of the crew of a coast guard patrol boat stationed at Arundel Cove leaped overboard and swam for their lives when a freakish gasoline fire late today caused a slight explosion in the vessel's engine room and threatened a 500 gallon fuel tank.

The blaze was extinguished. It was thought that a hot rivet dropped by repairmen working on another boat may have ignited the gasoline.

STABBER ACTIVE AGAIN

Bridgeport Girl Slashed in Crowd; Attacker Escapes

BRIDGEPORT, Conn., Aug. 27.—(AP)—The "phantom stabber," who has terrorized this city with his periodic activities for the past 30 months, suddenly appeared today in a crowded downtown department store, to claim his twenty-third victim, Isabelle Pelaskur, fourteen, a messenger girl, who was slashed in the side.

Although there were scores of shoppers and employees in the immediate vicinity, the man escaped unobserved. The girl got only a glimpse of him as he darted away.

BASIN PROJECT FAVORED

Adoption Will Be Urged Upon President at Rapid City

SPOKANE, Aug. 27.—(AP)—Federal adoption of the Columbia basin irrigation project will be urged upon President Coolidge by Harvey Lindley of Seattle at Rapid City, S. D., Tuesday morning when the president receives a delegation of backers of the project from the four Pacific northwestern states, Mr. Lindley said here today.

SIGHT DETROIT PLANE NEARING CROYDON FIELD

Around the World Racers Pass Over Plymouth, 200 Miles from Goal

HUNDREDS WATCH SHIP

Adverse Wind to Be Encountered Today, Says Forecast; Early Start Precludes Three-Cornered Race

PLYMOUTH England, Aug. 28.—(AP)—The Monoplane Pride of Detroit shimmering in the fresh morning air swung across Plymouth about 7 o'clock this morning and after circling over the city proceeded eastward toward Croydon. She was watched by hundreds including a number of passengers landing from a New York steamer.

Plymouth is approximately 200 miles by air from Croydon field, the objective of the trans-Atlantic fliers on board the Pride of Detroit, which took off from Harbor Grace, N. F., Saturday morning. At the rate the plane had been maintaining, the distance should be covered in around two hours.

Hop Off Early Yesterday

NEW YORK, Aug. 27.—(AP)—The first race against time around the world by airplane was under way tonight with the Stinson-Detroler monoplane Pride of Detroit over the Atlantic on its way to London, the first stopping place.

Edward F. Schlee, president of the Wayco Oil company of Detroit, and Wm. S. Brock hopped off from Harbor Grace, Newfoundland, 5:14, eastern standard time, this morning in their attempt to beat the world girdling record of 23 days, 15 hours and 30 minutes.

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SEEKS \$100,000 FROM MEXICANS

AUNT OF SLAIN STUDENT MAKES CLAIM

Mazatlan Hospital Wires for \$200 To Defray Treatment Expenses

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 27.—(AP)—Mrs. Jean Garrison, aunt of Florence M. Anderson, fatally wounded in a Mexican train attack last Tuesday, said the hospital at Mazatlan, Sinaloa, wired her today asking \$200 in payment of treatment for Miss Anderson and preparation of her body for shipment.

Mrs. Garrison said she had demanded through the state department at Washington reparations from the Mexican government of \$100,000 for her niece's death.

NOGALES, ARIZONA, Aug. 27.—(AP)—The body of Miss Florence M. Anderson, 27, school teacher of Los Angeles, who was fatally wounded in an attack on the train in which she was returning from Mexico City passed across the international boundary here today headed for Los Angeles.

A small crowd had gathered at the boundary gates to watch the transfer of the coffin, enclosed in a pine box, from the Mexican train to an American express car.

SPOKANE, Aug. 27.—(AP)—Charles P. Anderson, newspaper man and father of Miss Florence M. Anderson, victim of Mexican bandits, said tonight he did not know Mrs. Jean Garrison of Los Angeles who is quoted as claiming to be an aunt of Miss Anderson, and who Associated Press dispatches stated, proposed to take the body to Denver for burial. The body is due in Los Angeles Sunday morning.

"I intend to bury the girl in California," Mr. Anderson said. "That is the burial place of other relatives who had resided there for years."

Despatches today stated that Mrs. Garrison had said she had demanded, through the state department at Washington, reparations from the Mexican government of \$100,000 for her niece's death.
