First Public Studio Building Completed in Salem

There are undoubtedly some persons in Salem who do not realize that this city has its first public studio building. It is located in the new Nelson building on Court street.

The building, which has been designed and built by Mr. A. C. Nelson of Salem, is of the Spanish type of architecture and is one of the most beautiful in Salem. Its most attractive feature is the concert hall which is for the use of any organization in Salem, the

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rent for an evening being extremely reasonable. It will seat approximately two hundred persons.

The ceilings of the hall, as well as all other ceilings in the building, are finished in cove style. The woodwork is completed in driftwood finish which blends with the natural shade of the floors. The stage curtains will be of wine yellow and the hall will be furnished by Mr. Nelson, with a grand piano. Complete dressing rooms are built at the left and right of the stage.

The studios are finished according to the individual taste of the occupant. Miss Minnetta Magers, and Miss Ruth Bedford have adjoining studios, the walls of Miss Magers' rooms being tinted a peach color and those of Miss Bedford, cream, with ivory wood work.

The formal opening of the building will be held September 5. A program, with all those who have studios in the building taking part, will be held at two thirty o'clock in the afternoon and eight o'clock in the evening. The rooms will be open for the inspection of the public following the program.

Those having studios in the building are Minnetta Magers, teacher of voice, Miss Ruth Bedford, piano, William Wallace Graham, violin, Mrs. Walter Denton, piano, Frank E. Churchill, piano and pipe organ, and Miss Carol Dibble, teacher of expression.

The east half of the upper floor is occupied by the White School of the Dance.

The floor of this Spanish ballroom is of oak, cushioned seats line the walls, and the woodwork is also of driftwood finish. A special room for ballet work has also been finished for Mrs. White.

The Wednesday Night Derby Building Orchestra will play each afternoon and evening.

The White School of the Dance will also be open for inspection September 5.
