

4TH INNING RALLY WINS FOR SOLONS

The Mt. Scott Tigers lost their last opportunity of further competition for the silver cup in the Portland City league here Sunday at Oxford park by dropping a game to the Salem Senators 10 to 4. The fourth inning rally by the Senators in which they got to Clow, Tiger southpaw twirler, for five hits and four runs started the visitors on their downfall.

Wayne Barham, who was relieved in the fifth inning by Beck because of his sore arm bothering him, allowed but five hits and three runs. In the third inning he pitched only three balls. Buono hit an easy grounder to Billy Sullivan on first, Seales and Baily flew out to centerfield and rightfield respectively, on the first ball pitched to each of them. Beck allowed three hits and one run during his three inning session on the mound for the Senators and struck out seven men.

Clow, pitching for the visitors, was nicked for 11 hits and seven runs before he was relieved by Ducky Drake, former The Dalles relief pitcher, took over the duties. Four more hits and two runs were scored off Drake.

Goodwin, leading off for the visitors in the first inning, flew out to right field. Helmcke hit a fielder's choice and Hilgers automatically retired the side by getting in the way of a batted ball between second and third. Billy Sullivan, first man up for the Salem team swatted out a two bagger. Joe Sullivan sacrificed. Goleman hit a fly to shortstop. Billy scored on Steers' single for the first run of the game. Jacobberger went out on another fielder's choice.

The second inning was hitless and scoreless on both sides, the Mt. Scott batters going out on the first three balls pitched by Barham and the Salem batters all flying out in one-two-three order. Salem had five men at bat in the third, collecting two hits and one run for their efforts. Billy Sullivan was the fulcrum of this rally also.

Hilgers, first man up for the Tigers, in the fatal fourth, singled advanced a base on Calkins one-bagger. Helmcke smashed a hard blow over the right field fence for a two bagger, scoring Hilgers. Buono connected for a fielder's choice and Calkins went out trying to make home. Seales was given a walk, advanced a base on an error by Ridings and scored on Minto's hard grounder.

Jacobberger, initial batsman for the home team, was hit by the pitcher and took his base. Ridings bunted and beat it out. McKenna singled, filling the bases. Jacobberger crossed the plate on Edwards' sacrifice. Barham and Billy Sullivan both drew one-baggers, scoring Ridings and McKenna. Barham scored on Sullivan's hard grounder through centerfield, and Billy Sullivan scored on Goleman's hit.

When the scorers checked up at the close of this fast and furious inning, they found that 16 men had been at bat on the two teams, eight hits and seven runs had been marked down. This put Salem in the lead 6 to 3.

The fifth was scoreless. Salem scored two men in the sixth on a two bagger by Edwards, Barham's single, Billy Sullivan's walk and his brother's sacrifice.

The visitors connected for two hits and Minto scored in the seventh, while the home boys claimed three hits and two runs on Steers' and Jacobberger's singles and Edwards' two-bagger in favor of Salem.

The eighth and ninth cantos were scoreless, each team collecting one hit apiece in the ninth. The fans did not show up well for the game, many seats in both the bleachers and grandstand being unoccupied with no apparent reason for non-attendance as far as weather conditions were concerned.

The Senators play the Bend team at Bend next Sunday and go to The Dalles to play The Dalles team on Labor Day, Monday, Sept. 5th.

DEMPEY FORSAKES GLOVES FOR CLUBS

CHICAGO, Aug. 29.—(AP)—Jack Dempsey cast aside his boxing gloves for 18 holes of golf today, disappointing a crowd of 4,000 that gathered outside the gates at the Lincoln field race track willing to part with \$1.10 each to watch the former world heavyweight champion take healthy socks at his sparring partners.

Dempsey did no boxing, in accordance with the orders of Leo P. Flynn, his manager, who figured that too much work and no play would be harmful. Dempsey has engaged in strenuous boxing four days in a row. The former title holder hoofed seven miles on the road this morning with a better runner than Dempsey ever hoped to be. His companion on the road was Jole Ray, one time holder of nearly every middle distance running record in America.

SPECULATOR, N. Y., Aug. 29.—(AP)—After three days of rain the sun came out just in time today to allow Gene Tunney six rounds of work as a pre-final warmup before leaving Thursday for Chicago, scene of the heavyweight's return battle with Jack Dempsey next month.

When the weather suddenly cleared Gene forsook the cosy log fire in his living room and hurried to the covered training shack across the road with Billy Vidabeck, middleweight. After three rounds of punching at the light bag, the champion worked three speedy rounds with the New Jersey youngster.

Fear of overdoing after the lay-off that has kept him out of the ring since last Thursday held the workout down to six rounds. Gene weighted in at 192 pounds before the drill, about six more than his fighting weight last fall when he won the title from Dempsey at Philadelphia.

ALCOHOL FROM IODINE

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29.—(AP)—Steps were taken by the treasury to prevent bootleggers from extracting alcohol from half-strength tincture of iodine when officials said, will stop manufacture of the product.

Prohibition Commissioner Doran announced the success of chemists employed by bootleggers in extracting the alcohol had led to necessary to discontinue the formula under which half-strength iodine was manufactured. The order does not interfere with the making of full-strength iodine. The cost of removing alcohol from it is so high, Doran said, that the bootlegger gains no profit from the operations.

ESCAPES THE GALLOWS

Extension of Time Allowed for Drawing up New Briefs

OLYMPIA, Wash., Aug. 29.—(AP)—G. E. M. Pratt, new attorney for Wallace Cloyes Gains, sentenced to die for killing his 22 year old daughter June 16 last year, was today granted an extension until October 26 in which to prepare for rehearing the case, by Chief Justice Kenneth MacIntosh of the state supreme court. The extension was granted to allow Pratt, who recently replaced John M. Carmody and Robert S. McFarlane, as defense counsel, time to familiarize himself with details of the case.

It is understood that Gains' defense will be based upon a contention that Sylvia was not murdered and that the body discovered on the shores of Green lake was that of a Portland woman slain by persons who spirited Sylvia away.

BOND HOUSE ATTACKED

Bankruptcy Proceedings Against Dean Onatavia

NEW YORK, Aug. 29.—(AP)—An involuntary petition in bankruptcy was filed in United States district court today against Dean Onatavia and company, for many years one of the best known stock exchange houses in Wall street.

On July 18, the concern made an assignment for the benefit of the creditors to E. A. Pierce and company. Liabilities were estimated at \$2,600,000 and assets at \$1,500,000. The petition charges the assignment was part of an attempt to defraud certain creditors through preferential payments to others.

SPORTS DONE BROWN

CHICAGO—A bond of affection akin to that which exists between father and son has grown up between Tex Rickard and Jack Dempsey.

Their attachment for each other transcends the ordinary feeling of appreciation that might come from the manner in which their mutual relations have netted them their fortunes.

This is apparent in watching the two together and in talking with Rickard.

The latter has been in the game enough to become "hard" in the matter of taking his meal tickets closer to his bosom than the cashier's window. But Dempsey has crept through the barrier Rickard might well be pointed out as the greatest worshipper Dempsey has—and they seem now to run from coast to coast.

Talk to Rickard of Dempsey and he enters into the discussion, not with the forced pleasantness with which he discusses this, that or the other but with the dotting interest of a proud dad.

"Did you ever see a fellow like him in your life?" Rickard asks. And then he proceeds to tell you of Dempsey's boyish pranks just as fathers have recited the unusually interesting sidelights of the children's activities since time began.

Rickard, probably more than anyone else, has watched the change in Dempsey over the last eleven months.

"Last year at this time Jack would worry you by the way he acted," said Rickard during a chat recently.

"He seemed to have lost his ambition. Little things worried him. It was hard to shake him out of it. The playfulness that he used to have was gone."

"Now he's a different fellow entirely. He seems eager to be doing something. And he usually is—some kind of horse play. Came in the other day and turned the office upside down by scattering the correspondence all over the place and mauling some of the boys around. Laughing, all the while he did it, just like any mischievous kid."

"You like to have him do it—that's what gets you."

"I'm going to play golf with him tomorrow," the promoter added. And he said it not as though the game was arranged for publicity or business reasons but as though he looked forward to it as a day off with his "boy."

I think you can accept the sincerity of feeling over the knowledge that Rickard may well feel grateful toward Dempsey and Jack toward Tex for the mutual aid they have rendered each other financially.

Dempsey's new found confidence in himself is indicated by the recital of the chat he had with Tex before the articles to meet Tunney this second time were signed.

"Most anybody would climb in to the ring for the money that I'll get for meeting Gene," said Jack "But I wouldn't consider for a minute signing up for the bout if I wasn't pretty sure that I could win it. For the simple reason that I wouldn't trade the friends I've won the last few months for the money I'll get. Lots of fellows can earn as much money as you're offering me for this fight but it doesn't come to everybody to have the friends I have. I didn't have them until I lost the title and I wouldn't lose them by going into this affair to make a farce out of it."

There was no heckling over the finances. And those who know Dempsey will tell you that it was his desire to play square with the public that helped widen the breach between himself and "Get-all-you-can" Kearns.

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AMERICAN-ENGLISH STARS MEET TODAY

FOREST HILLS, N. Y., Aug. 29.—(AP)—Helen Willis, 21 year old Californian, and Betty Nuthall, 16 year old English girl, will match their youth and skill tomorrow in an international battle for the American women's tennis championship.

Blond and blue-eyed Betty, sensation of the tournament, fought her way to the final today by overcoming Mrs. Charlotte Hosmer Chapin, conqueror of Mrs. Molla Mallory, in three sets, 6-1, 4-6, 6-3, while Miss Willis crushed her Californian rival, Miss Helen Jacobs, in the same relentless fashion she has disposed of all her other opponents so far. The scores were 6-0, 6-2.

Miss Nuthall will be in the thick of two title battles, for with Miss Joan Fry as her partner she reached the doubles final by defeating two country women, Miss Gwyneth Sterry and Mrs. John Hill, 6-3, 6-3.

In an all-British final for this American championship, they will meet Mrs. Kitty McKane Godfree and Miss E. H. Harvey, who put out last native team today when they defeated Miss Eleanor Goss and Mrs. Chapin, 6-4, 7-5.

In the singles final, the two youthful aces of British and American tennis will meet for the first time and Miss Willis is hopeful of wearing for the fourth time in five years.

There are all the elements of youthful skill, drama and color involved in this test, the first time they have met, but it will be regarded as nothing short of a tennis catastrophe if Miss Willis does not merge the victor.
