SUGAR BEETS MAKE LIVELY BUSINESS

A Salem man making an automobile tour in Montana several days ago was struck by the enormous tonnage of sugar beets being delivered by wagon and truck—

In one or two sections automobile travel was slowed up very much by this rush of the raw supplies over the highways to the factories. The procession, day and night, seemed endless. And the Salem man noted the lively appearance of business in the towns and cities affected by the sugar beet harvest and the operation of the factories.

This Salem man could not help visualizing the busy scenes on the highways of the Salem district with beet sugar factories here, in addition to our flax and linen industries and our great and growing fruit industry, and other live industries on the land—

Not overlooking the vast indirect benefits in the addition of a paying cultivated rotation crop, and one that would with its by-product build up the dairying and live stock breeding and poultry raising and other industries on the land—

Every industry on the land—

As no other one thing could.

The progress of the sugar beet industry in England, where it is new, is interesting to the people of the Salem district. A contract has just been signed between the factories and the farmers for a term of three years, under which the prices to be paid for beets is slightly lowered, compared with this year's prices, owing to the fact that there will be a lowering by a third of the government subsidy for manufacturing beet sugar. The subsidy law of parliament provided a ten-year term for the subsidy, with a sliding scale downward. But the ministry of agriculture reports that the average tonnage to the acre has been increasing, so that the farmers will likely make as high net profits in the future as they have in the past; especially because their greater familiarity with growing beets gives them a downward tendency in costs of growing.

They increased their per acre tonnage yields from 7.67 tons in 1925 to 8.63 tons last year.

The tonnage per acre for the Salem district ought to average 15 in the Salem district, with a higher average sugar content than can be secured from beets grown in England.

One astonishing thing is the fact that about half the dried beet pulp tonnage of England comes to the United States. When the Salem district gets sugar factories, the dried pulp ought to be all used at home; every pound of it, fed to dairy cattle and other live stock.

It is interesting to Salem district people that construction on the first beet sugar factory in the Argentine Republic was begun July 9, with a great celebration and formal ceremonies.
