Annual Horse Show Will Open In Salem Next Week

The annual horse show which has become one of the outstanding features of the Oregon state fair, will be held in the stadium, beginning next Monday evening and continuing the five remaining evenings of the fair, and as a result horse owners and horse lovers of the Pacific Northwest are turning their attention to Salem.

Reports of prize winning horses which will be shown here are being received daily. Competition in all classes promises to be keener this year than at any local showing heretofore. Governor Isaac Lee Patterson, W. F. Turner, and Aaron M. Frank have offered prizes in various classifications.

Much interest is evinced in the splendid new hackney pair, Stella Vane and Buckley Vedic, imported recently from England by Aaron M. Frank of Portland. This pair easily outclassed all other entrants at their first American showing at the annual horse show held late in the summer in Stockholm, California.
