



The exact nature and amount of explosives stored at the depot could not be immediately learned. Curtis Bay lies several miles southwest of Baltimore, along the Patapsco river. A large quantity of ammunition and explosives had been kept there for some years. Following the late Denmark, N. J., disaster however, protests against the Curtis Bay dump were made to the war department and part of the stores later were removed.


