INDIANA WILL REAR TEMPLE TO LINCOLN

The edifice will be a departure from the usual sophisticated type of architecture, Mr. Hibben explained.

"We seek to create a symbol of the great power and gentleness that was Lincoln," said the architect. "Such gentleness is not negative, but infinite and human. Such power is the nobility of strength, the understanding of all humanity in its reality."

The memorial will be approximately 200 feet in each direction, comprising a series of four open courts of simple masonry surrounding a main building from which rises a shaft 150 feet high. Around the building, above the arches, will run a band of sculpture portraying in relief the birth and development of the race. Murals and paintings will decorate the ceilings of the cloisters. Within the shaft will be suspended a set of chimneys.

The grounds surrounding the memorial will be landscaped to reproduce the scene as it was during the 14 years the boy Lincoln lived and toiled there.

Indiana has turned over 70 acres surrounding the grave site to the Lincoln Union and it is proposed to buy 30 additional acres to take in the cabin site.

Frank C. Ball, manufacturer and philanthropist of Muncie, is chairman of the committee to raise funds for the memorial. Officers of the Indiana Lincoln Union include Mrs. Anne Studebaker Carlisle of South Bend, Will Hay and Thomas Taggart, George Ade and Booth Tarkington, authors; Kent Cooper, general manager of the Associated Press, and William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor, are members of the Union.


