FATAL INJURIES 15

348 Injuries During Month, Report Indicates

There were 15 persons killed and 348 persons injured in a total of 2506 traffic accidents during the month of August, according to a report prepared here yesterday by T. A. Raffety, chief inspector for the state motor vehicle department.

The report showed that 1364 of the accidents were due to careless driving, while 298 accidents were caused by drivers falling to give the right of way. In 144 accidents the operators failed to give the proper signals. Fifty-three accidents were caused by skidding, 11 by obstructed view and 100 because of speeding.

There were a total of 235 arrests during the month due to the activities of the state traffic officers. Thirty-eight of these cases are now pending in the courts.

The state traffic officers recovered stolen motor vehicles having a resale value of \$3745, and collected delinquent taxes in the amount of \$5192.85. Fines imposed on motor vehicle law violators aggregated \$3826.45, while fines imposed for other offenses, totaled \$506. Bad checks were collected in the amount of \$117.34.

SATE COLLEGE HAS BIG DISPLAY BOOTH

Mining, Art, and Military Activities All Exhibited At State Fair

One of the largest exhibits ever arranged by Oregon Agricultural college is being shown this year in the old pavilion. The display is being managed by students from the college.

Mineral rocks taken from Oregon mines, and other mines throughout the world are being shown in one of the booths. Among the mineral rocks shown are white metal ores from southern Oregon, and gold ores from the recent gold strikes at Sisters, Oregon.

In the department of arts, a sizeable collection of pastel drawings and oil paintings are displayed, some of them of considerable merit.

Military trophies and guns of all descriptions are there to be viewed by visitors. Shrapnel Bullets used in the world war are shown.

At intervals throughout the afternoon, moving pictures of engineering construction are shown on a screen for those interested. The pictures are shown under supervision of the engineering school.
