

Factory at 1441 Center Wil Be One of Most Modern in State

Plant, located at 1441 Center street, is rapidly being completed and will make of this plant one of the best and most modern in the state. The new addition is 42 feet square with a height inside of 25 feet, making room for an additional 800 tons of ice.

Frank N. Waters, proprieton of this plant, states that his business

airs have lessened the ice business, Mr. Waters says that he has lost only about ten customers to the frigidaires, but in the same time has gained over one hundred new residence accounts.

"The frigidaire people have actually helped our business by their program of advertising in which they advise the need for refrigermany people find it too expensive about \$200, with four to five dollars a month for upkeep, when their total ice bill with my plant will run about \$15 a year. However, the frigidaire is a mighty fine thing for anyone who can afford it."

Scored ice is used at this plant, which means that the ice is marked off in units of 25 or 50 pounds, just as a piece of glass is scratched before it is to be broken. This leaves nothing to do but stick a pick into the ice at the place to be broken off, eliminating much loss of time by the driver in sawing, as done under the old method.

A system of coils in the new
