NORTHERN CHINESE WIN BIG VICTORIES

City of Suanhwafu Recaptured After Severe Fighting For Two Days

PEKING, Oct. 8.—(AP)—The tide of battle north of Peking has turned with the recapture of Suanhwafu, 85 miles north of the capital, by northern forces from the Shansi invaders. It was officially reported today.

The northern troops drove back the invaders after a two day battle, taking five battalions prisoners and capturing a quantity of ammunition. Today the northern forces were continuing their advance, hurrying the retreating Shansi troops, the advices stated.

The northerners are still on the defensive on the Peking-Hankow front in the south, except at Pao-tungfu, 85 miles southwest of Peking, where the Shansi forces had advanced to within three miles of the city. At this juncture the northern forces counter-attacked and hurled back their opponents, 20 miles.

It was announced that the northerners would commence a general counter-attack along the southern front tomorrow.

Other official reports indicate that General Chang Tsung-Chang governor of Shantung, has ordered 60,000 Chihli and Shantung troops stationed at Tsangchow in the southeastern part of Chihli to march westward in order to attack the right flank of the Shansi forces in the neighborhood of Pao-tungfu.

MEDFORD, Oct. 8.—(AP)—A jury in the federal court this morning returned a verdict of guilty on two counts of the indictment charging conspiracy to violate the national prohibition act against W. B. Barnes, justice of the peace of Klamath Falls and former Klamath county sheriff and A. D. Lambert, son of a Klamath Falls councilman. They were found guilty of maintaining a nuisance and possession of liquor. L. D. Rice, a co-defendant, was guilty on one count, maintaining a nuisance.
