Salem Artist Series Will Feature Brailowsky Here on October 27

Alexander Brailowsky, "the great poet of the key board," is to open the Salem Artist Series at the Elsinore Theater Thursday evening, October 27th. So much has been written in praise of "this great pelyer since Rubinstein," that one is almost overwed in contemplation. We were completely "bowled over" by the Titanic powers and the complex attributes of this young genius" said Herman Defries in the Chicago American. And the Minneapolis Star declared: "No player of the piano that I can call to mind, including the golden Pole," seems to me to make himself so much a part of his instrument as Brailowsky. Those who heard Brailowsky's concert in Portland last March will recall the almost hypnotic spell he cast upon his audience. Encores after encores were demanded and finally the stage manager had to come on the platform and close the piano before the tumultuous applause was still.

Three other international stars will appear on the Salem Artist Series this season. Edward Johnson, tenor of the Metropolitan, whom John McCormack said was "the greatest living operatic tenor" will be heard here in November. Mary Lewis, gloriously

beautiful and brilliantly talented soprano of the Metropolitan and former Ziegfeld; Follies girl comes in January. As the closing event on the course the London String Quartet will be heard in one of their programs which have earned for them the reputation of "the world's greatest chamber of music organization."

Chloe E. Nero who had charge of the course last year is now in the city for a few days and is devoting her time in laying plans for a final campaign on season tickets. It will be remembered that it was through the efforts of Mrs. Nero as representative of the Wolfsohn Bureau of New York that Salem was afforded the opportunity of hearing four internationalists last year and because of these efforts and the splendid support of the Willamette valley music loving public, the Elsinore theater management is this year taking full financial responsibility of bringing the four brilliant events which are scheduled. In order that Salem may be included in the list of cities which support a concert course made up of the greatest artists in the world today it will be necessary for everyone to rally to the support of this second annual Salem Artist Series.
