

Variety and Many Knockouts Please Fans in Hurriedly Changed Card

TED FOX REVEALS PROMISING PUNCH

Considering the sudden necessity of cancelling the scheduled main event between Phil Bayes and Ad Mackie, because of the death of Bayes' father yesterday, Matchmaker Plant produced a 32-round card at the armory last night which for variety would be hard to equal. It wasn't the best card in the world, but the fans got what they usually holler for—plenty of knockouts.

Bobby McIntyre, flushed with his victory over Stanley Stewart in Portland Tuesday night, got the most of Young Billy Edwards early in the eight round main event, and from then on danced about the Kansas City lightweight looking in hard blows until Edwards went down for the count in the seventh.

Edwards arrived in Salem just recently. Having worked out here only a short time, he was not in first class boxing condition. He was willing enough, and followed McIntyre around like a cat after a fish cart, but the Salem boys was fish clever for him. One of Edwards' favorite tactics was to throw a left jab, which McIntyre would paw over him. Another was to take wide swings at his opponent, which missed, swinging him around to fall into a series of McIntyre's blows.

In the sixth round, McIntyre knocked a gold crown out of Edwards' mouth. Edwards began to get groggy from then on, and a hard blow from McIntyre in the seventh sent him down in the middle of the ring. He tried to get up, but couldn't make it. McIntyre got a thickened eye of the fray, but aside from that is little worse for his two fights in a row.

In the eight-round semi-windup, the coming Salem scrapper, Teddy Fox, let Billy Leonard, of Portland, last just exactly two minutes and ten seconds. Fox is one of the most promising boys ever to appear in the local ring, and he certainly added to his glory last night. Leonard is not set-up, but he looked mediocre against the Fox rushes.

The big joke of the card was the scheduled match between Si Flook, of Mill City, and Kid Lange of Oregon City. Referee Frys called it no-contest after the Oregon City lad had taken one flop, and tried another deliberately to avoid Flook's right.

At Sharp, Salem, got a decision over Earl Morrison, Portland; Eddie Graham, another Salem lad who shows promise of becoming one of the cleverest fist swingers in this section, knocked Jack Plant of Oregon City, down twice in the second round, scoring a knockout on the one; and Gene O'Connell, earned a decision over Oscar Smith, of Salem, in four rounds.

The crowd was good despite the cancelled main event. Stanley Frys pleased the crowd with his fair decisions, and Warren Jones did such a good job announcing that he has been named official announcer for the cards this season.

Matchmaker Plant declared last night that new blood would be offered in the main event two weeks hence. The Bayes-Mackie fight will not be re-scheduled for a while yet. Jack Dillon of Portland, who was introduced last night at the arena, may get the call to meet some likely candidate.

JOHNSON READY TO QUIT OFFICE

CHICAGO, Oct. 12.—(AP)—President Ban Johnson of the American league tonight entered the stretch run of his career as a baseball power after serving the league twenty seven years.

The retiring president called a meeting of his board of directors for Chicago next Monday when the affairs of the league will be presented to them preparatory to his surrendering office at that time. All the records and financial affairs have been checked and audited and it is now a matter of complete record of transactions that have taken place since the one time year of organized baseball took up his duties in 1900.

The directors are Frank J. Navin of the Detroit club; Clark Griffith of Washington; Phil Ball of St. Louis; and Ben Shibe of Philadelphia.

President Johnson said he intended surrendering the affairs of the league without waiting until November 1, the date his resignation was to become effective. He did not give any intimation who would succeed him; declaring he had no knowledge whatever of the club owners' intention.

Rumors within the circuit, however, indicate that H. S. Bernard, president of the Cleveland club, is the choice of the club owners and that his election will be announced when President Johnson's term of office expires. The headquarters will be maintained in Chicago.

NEW YORK, Oct. 12.—(AP).—The 1927-28 seasons of baseball's "hot stove league" may not develop as startling food for winter fans as last year but there are already a number of shifts in prospect to enliven the off season. The fate of Kiki Cuyler, Pirate outfield star who warmed the bench during the world series, has aroused especially keen speculation on the assumption that Pittsburgh for reasons best known to its own officials will not keep him another year.

Brooklyn has an excellent collection of pitching talent, which might interest the Pirates in any talk of trade.

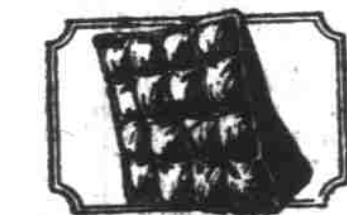

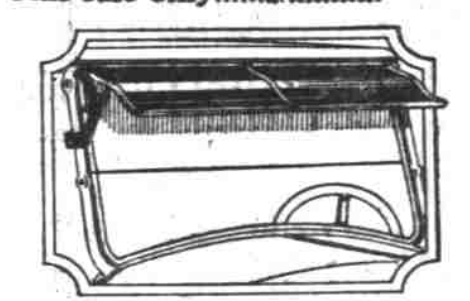

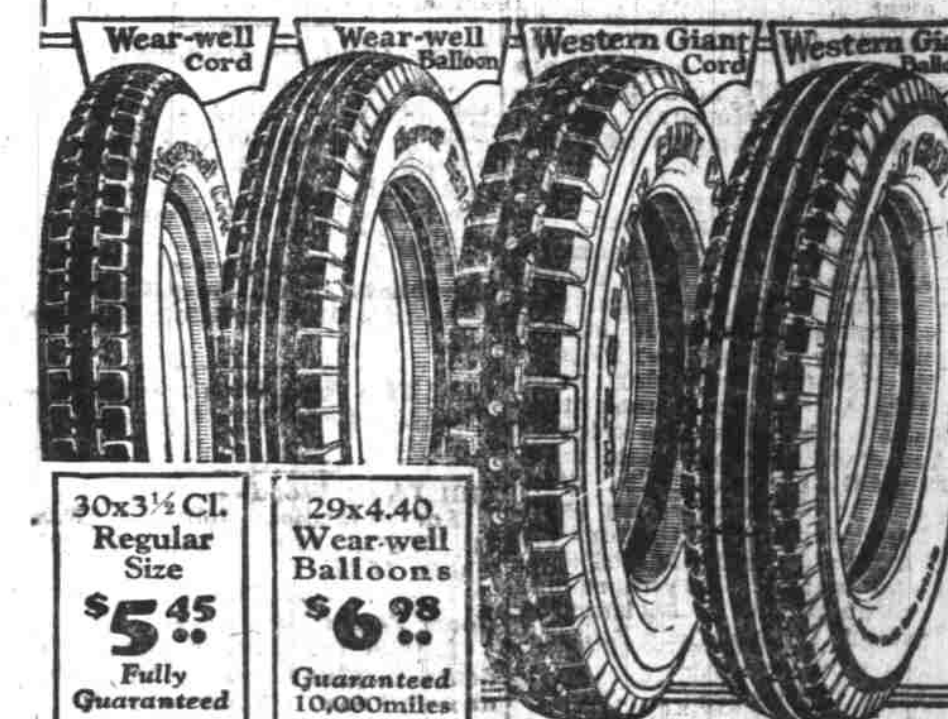
