MONROE DOCTRINE HELD

Selection of Officers and Choosing  
1928 Convention City Made  
Special Order of Business  
Today

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 12.—(AP)—The American Federation of Labor went on record as affirming the Monroe doctrine when its national convention today condemned a resolution which opposed the interference of the United States military forces in the affairs of other countries.

The defeated resolution, which had expressed opposition to what it described as the imperialistic policy of the United States, and to the country's sending troops and ships to China, was condemned in the report of the resolutions committee as having no regard for the truth. The convention voted its affirmation of the committee's report, which upheld the Monroe doctrine.

Three resolutions affecting Colorado river development were reported out of committee with recommendations that will be referred to the executive council for investigation and later report. No action was taken on the committee report, because of the approach of the noon adjournment hour.

Henry S. McClusky, delegate from Arizona and member of that state's Colorado river commission, arose apparently prepared to oppose side-stepping of action by this convention, but debate on the committee report was postponed until tomorrow morning.

The recommendation was that the council seek a method of procedure for approval by the next

convention which would protect the needs of affected states for adequate supplies of water and power.

Y. M. C. A. Holds Northwest  
Sectional Meet, Portland

PORTLAND, Oct. 12.—(AP)—The phase of education and the organization's international responsibilities were discussed today by leaders of the Young Women's Christian association at the northwest sectional conference attended by delegates from Washington, Idaho, Montana and Oregon. Before the conference ends tomorrow it was hoped sentiment from this section would have been crystallized for presentation at the national convention to be held in Sacramento next year.

Mrs. J. L. Greenwell of Seattle presided over the afternoon session today, with Miss Mary Sims, executive of the national city department leading the discussion on international work with particular reference to China.

German Plane Heads West  
U. S. Machine Still in Maine

BRUNSBUTTEL-AM-ELBE, Germany, Oct. 12.—(AP)—The Heinkel hydro-airplane D-1220 which today began flight on the first leg of a proposed journey to America by way of Azores tonight rested on the waters of the Elbe awaiting a new anchor before taking off again Thursday.

At 1:21 o'clock this afternoon the hydro-airplane lifted itself out of the sunlit waters of the Elbe at Warnemuende and took off on a southwesterly course in the direction of the English channel. Later in the afternoon the plane descended to the waters of the Elbe here, after a flight of approximately 130 miles.

The pilot, Herst Merz, well known Luftwaffe navigator, said the descent was caused by a defective radiator. In the descent, however, the plane's anchor was lost in the Elbe. When the radiator was repaired it was decided that the plane would hop for Amsterdam tomorrow. The loss of the anchor, an added complication, caused postponement of the take-off until Thursday.

Besides Merz, the crew of the D-1220 are Fritz Rhode, mechanic and Wilhelm Bock, pilot.

OLD ORCHARD, Maine, Oct. 12.—(AP)—A howling wind rapidly approaching gale proportions tonight indefinitely held up the Sikorsky plane, The Dawn, in which Mrs. Frances W. Grayson and two men aviators had planned to hop off at 5 o'clock for Copenhagen.

The plane stood ready on the sand above the high water mark with tanks filled and motors pronounced perfect for the start.

A final telephone conversation with the New York weather bureau showed however, that conditions would grow rapidly worse, so announcement was made that the flight would await better weather conditions. Eric Goldsborough, the navigator after plotting weather reports from 11 ships at sea with the aid of Pilot Wilmer Stultz, pointed out that 80 miles off shore the amphibian plane would meet a cross wind of 40 miles velocity, which would reduce its speed by 20 miles an hour. Steamer Runs Aground  
Off Coast of Oregon

PORTLAND, Oct. 13.—(AP)—The Federal Telegraph company here reported the following message from the steamship Providencia, received this morning: "Fog thick and rain over Cape Blanco rock at 10:30 p. m. We proceeded about 30 minutes later. Holds are dry; damage will be in engine room if any, but nothing located yet. Proceeding to Tacoma."

SAN PEDRO, Cal., Oct. 12.—(AP)—The Federal Telegraph company late tonight received a message from the steamer Providencia saying it had run ashore at Cape Blanco, on the Oregon coast. The ship reported it had not as yet learned its exact condition but believed that it was in no immediate danger.

Cape Blanco is situated approximately half way between the Columbia river and the California line.

The Providencia is owned by the Company Du Boleo whose headquarters are said to be in San Francisco. It was carrying ore to smelters at Tacoma, Wash.

60 Mile Gale Sweeps  
Southern Alaska Coast

KETCHIKAN, Alaska, Oct. 12.—(AP)—A southwest gale which reached a velocity of sixty miles an hour sank two small boats today and forced the Canadian Pacific liner Princess Alice to return to this port after leaving for Vancouver, B. C. The Princess Alice started again for Vancouver this

afternoon when the gale subsided. A dredge enroute north to Wrangell Narrows dragged its anchor for several hours but was brought safely to dock. Trees were uprooted here and several roads were blocked by debris. No lives were reported lost.

Apple Pie Weighing One  
Ton Baked at Yakima

YAKIMA, Wash., Oct. 12.—(AP)—A giant apple pie weighing one ton will be baked here next Saturday for 1,000 school children in observance of National Apple week. The pie will be prepared by four bakers. A windlass and a system of ropes and pulleys will be used to lift the pie into a huge oven.

It is estimated that the pie will require one hour of baking while the apples to be used are to be cooked before being placed between the crusts so as to be sure they are cooked through. Girls from high school domestic science classes are to serve the pie to the 1,000 children.

STRONG TORNADO  
STRIKES ARKANSAS

Four Killed, Fourteen Hurt  
And \$100,000 Property  
Reported Damaged

BLITHEVILLE, Ark., Oct. 12.—(AP)—Four persons are dead, fourteen injured and more than a score business buildings and dwellings in ruins tonight following a tornado which dipped into the northeastern tip of Mississippi county last night, and vented its fury in the village of Dell, eleven miles southeast of Blitheville. Property damage was estimated at \$100,000.

All of the dead and most of the injured were crushed under falling timbers of their homes. Two negroes were injured when the storm struck a suburb of Blitheville and several others were hurt on plantations between this county and Dell.

W. P. Winn, a justice of the peace at Dell, and his wife, and Austin Hardin, and his sister in law, Mrs. J. A. Hardin, were killed.

The injured include: John Hardin, husband of the woman killed, and three other members of the Hardin family, and six members of the family of J. T. Green.

The Hardin home, directly in the path of the storm, was demolished and the bodies of the two persons killed there were carried about 100 yards from the wreckage of the house.

A Blitheville constable at Dell, described the storm as heralded with a terrific roar. "I have been in storms before but this one was the worst," he said. "At the end of Main street the greatest havoc was wrought, the sight which greeted rescuers was horrifying."
