Rural Students Fewer—
Only 238 students from school districts which have no high schools are enrolled in Salem high this year, as against 265 last year, indicating that farmers are experiencing something of a financial depression, according to Professor J. Solo Dancer 18 Years Old Topples Out of High Window

NEW YORK, Oct. 19.—(AP)—
Jane Johnson, an 18 year old solo dancer from Kansas City, was killed today in a fall from the window of her 12th story room in the Hotel Claridge. After talking with the girl's mother, Mrs. Ethel Johnson, who came here with the dancer three years ago to seek fame and fortune on the great White Way, police officials listed the death as accidental. Mrs. Johnson told the police that the dancer had arisen but a few minutes before the fall, which occurred in mid-morning. She complained of dizziness, the mother said, and went to the open window for fresh air.

GERMANS SEEK AIR LINE

Domination of Transatlantic Business Object of Firm

BERLIN, Oct. 19.—(AP)—
The trans-Atlantic flights of the German planes D-1220 and D-1230 have as their background a bid for any trans-oceanic plane service that may develop, it is understood in Berlin aviation circles. It was learned today that Dir Kiep of the Hamburg-American line, brother of Dr. Otto C. Kiep, charge d'affaires of the Germany embassy in Washington, recently left for the United States to await the arrival of the D-1220 and D-1230. He also was charged with the mission of negotiating with American capital for a regular hydro-airplane service between the United States and Germany. The Hamburg-American line is chief backer of the Heinkei D-1220 and the Junkers D-1230
