MAN RETAINED AS OLD SPANGLER, PORTLAND

attempt would be made to convict him on the indictment charging him with the murder of Harold Wehrman. This indictment had never been acted upon.

Old Crimes Recalled
And again today Portland police inspectors went through the list of horrible, unsolved murders—murders of girls and women and children—murders in which the women were ravished. The purpose of the investigation was plain.

Today Mrs. E. Miller, Portland, was called by police to view Pender in his cell. It was she who saw the man believed to have battered life from the body of Martha Gratke, 15, on April 22, 1924.

"He looks like him," Mrs. Miller said as she looked at Pender. "Almost exactly, if I were only certain."

And Mrs. Bertha Lake picked Pender from a lineup of nine men at the city jail. It was she, who, on March 14, 1911, saw the man who lured five year old Barbara Holzman to a room in her lodging house and there choked the child to death and ravished her.

Likeness Almost Perfect
"Never in my life have I seen a man who looked more like the man who killed Barbara," Mrs. Lake declared as she saw Pender. "But I cannot be sure."

Old newspaper clipping revealed today that the day the despoiled corpse of Barbara Holzman was found in the rooming house, the woman had described the man who rented the room as hollow-cheeked, six feet tall, and thin.

And today in his cell, sat Pender, a gangling, lanky, drooping form with his small, beady, brown eyes peering stealthily from behind heavy lids. Pender has not greatly changed in appearance in the passing years, those who knew him say.

And still another murder—perhaps the most horrible of the group, came in for renewed investigation today.

Four at Time
It was the brutal killing of William Hill, Ruth Hill, his wife and their two small children, a boy and a girl, in June 1911. The four were murdered with a hatchet in the hands of a maniac fiend. The bodies were hacked and cut indiscriminately. The mother and daughter were ravished.

Today from his office here, Ben W. Gleoit, former governor who pardoned Pender issued a statement. It said:

"At the time I was asked to extend executive clemency to Pender I made a most careful inquiry into his case and as a result of my investigation, I was of the opinion that the man was innocent. "What has recently happened in evidence that I was mistaken in my judgement. I regret the matter greatly and feel now that hanging would have been too good for him."

McNARY BEGINS WORK ON FARM LEGISLATION

preventing violent price fluctuations.

While he has not discarded the controverted equalization fee, it was obvious that the senator was looking with favor on both substitutes mentioned by him. The plan of the national grange would meet the losses sustained by farmers in disposing of surplus crops through export debentures which would entitle the holders to cash them at par out of receipts from customs collected by America's tariff.

How far the die-hard McNary supporters would go in supporting such a scheme, or with what favor it would be looked upon by the administration will be inquired into as soon as possible by Senator McNary, who expects to confer with President Coolidge soon, as well as with members of the group of western independent republican senators who have struck a snag on farm relief.

Off-hand, however, Senator Norris, of Nebraska, presidential

candidate of the independent group and McNary-Haugen supporter, does not look with much favor on debenture propositions, which he believes would merely be subsidizing the farmers by taking money from national incomes to meet their losses in marketing surplus crops. It is also regarded as unlikely that the president will cease vigilance over the treasury to this extent but Senator McNary intends to find out.

The agriculture chairman also made it clear that he was considering the administration plan to authorize considerable loans to cooperative marketing associations.
