

10TH YEAR SEEN
BY COMMUNISTSIMMENSE CELEBRATION IS
STAGED ON UNIVERSITYLong Parade Feature of Day;
Streets Jammed With Thousands of People

MOSCOW, Nov. 7.—(AP)—Moscow's big parade in honor of the tenth anniversary of the revolution ended late tonight with seemingly interminable home-ward processions winding through the streets in the crimson glow of the ebullient parade, however, Moscow's main street and revolutionary square continued seething with dense crowds listening to speeches and radio concerts while the wheels of traffic were at a complete standstill.

All the theatres and clubs gave gala performances and banquets for the workers, soldiers and peasants organizations. The restaurants and stores, which had been closed all day, will remain closed tomorrow.

In the course of the day opposition factions indulged in small skirmishes at various points in the line of march; they attempted to address the demonstrators, but were hounded down by loyal communists. Usually the incidents ended quickly without police interference.

At one point Leon Trotsky, former commissar of war and now opposed to the Stalin regime, riding in a carriage, attempted to pass a cordon of militiamen, but, not having the necessary passport, was held up and was obliged to take a different route, his only reaction being slight irritation, he betrayed by a somewhat bitter smile. Preobrazhensky and Smilga, oppositionists, attempted to address the marching columns from the balcony of a hotel, but they were hounded down, and quickly retired. The same hospitality greeted others carrying portraits of Trotsky, who attempted to cross the square, they had to withdraw in consequence of the resistance of the demonstrators.

With six of the Burns men who shadowed the jury as a back field audience, the internationally known detective lauded the virtues of his own men and startled his listeners with a demand to know why the district attorney has not made public a "complaint and affidavit" filed by his agents with Justice Suddens last Friday making charges against a government man.

Grand Jurors Hear

"The only person who has made contact with one of the jurors was a government employee and a newspaper reporter," he declared in a high-pitched voice that must have carried to the grand jurors in a nearby room.

There was a scattering of the news men, some heading for District Attorney Gordon's office, and others for the chambers of Jus-

Justice Suddens. The justice, who received no such "complaint and affidavit" in the case, Gordon asserted he had never seen anything like it and that Burns was in error if he contended as he did, that the facts recited were in the reports seized by government agents in the raid on the Burns men's headquarters at the Wardman Park hotel.

Affidavits Published
Later Burns made public copies of what purported to be affidavits of two of his operatives, William V. Long and F. J. O'Reilly. That by Long told of following an automobile bearing the license P-1738 to the Potomac river from Washington, where the occupant talked with Norman J. Glascock, juror number 10. This was on October 22, ten days before the government had a mistrial declared.

O'Reilly's affidavit was that the car bearing the license P-1738 was owned by Harry R. Lamb, a special assistant attorney general, who, the reports of the operatives showed, was shadowed for days and nights, or at least, the car bearing the license was.

Brands Burns as Liar
Lamb promptly was sent before the grand jury. When he came out he declared the allegations made by the Burns men were "lies," that he never had been at the Potomac flying field in his life; that on October 22, the day it was claimed his car was there, the car was in a shop for repairs and he did not obtain it until late in the day when he drove to the Washington golf and country club in nearby Virginia to play golf.

Nell Burkinehaw, assistant district attorney directing the grand jury inquiry, said the Lamb matter was a piece with many other things found in the reports of the operatives; charges which when run down proved to be without any foundation in fact.

Admits "Shadowing"
Burns freely conceded to newspaper men that Henry Mason Day employed the detective agency now conducted by his son to shadow the members of the oil conspiracy; declared that this was a proper thing for the "defense" to do and asserted such employment was justified by "the facts" obtained as to a government employee making contact with a juror.

"None of the Burns men made contacts with the jurors," he added. "Of course, they could not legally do that and if any did we will be glad to assist in his prosecution."

istration.

Worst in History
He called the flood disaster the most serious that has come to the affected section and he paid high tribute to the spirit of the people. With an absence of anything approaching disorder he found people attacking the task of reconstruction.

A pressing need, said General Brown, is to restore roads and railway tracks that communication may be re-established and supplies transported to those in need. He threw the forces of the army into the effort of the Red Cross and state and municipal authorities.

Troops are assisting civil authorities in the emergency and the army is furnishing blankets, bedding and food. The efforts of all relief agencies were centered today in the Winooksi valley where the need was greatest.

Many Homes Lost
Many persons found themselves homeless in the lower reaches of the Connecticut river, but their troubles were slight compared with those in the north.

To add to the difficulties of two flooded towns today fire added its burden.

At Ludlow, in central Vermont, and Cambridge, in the northwest, widely separated places, flames for a time presented an added menace. At Ludlow the bakery, an institution it could ill afford to lose, was burned.

The people are still too busy coming back to estimate losses and "millions" continued to be the only guess. Rutland estimated its losses at more than \$5,000,000.

Auxiliary Invited—

The ladies' auxiliary of Hal Hibbard Camp of Spanish American War veterans will be invited to a joint social affair with the camp on the night of November 21; according to announcement made last night. A general good time has been arranged, including special music.

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TAKE BRIDGE FIGHT
TO SUPREME COURTAction Taken With View to
Testing Validity of Congressional Act

PORTLAND, Nov. 7.—(AP)—

Validity of the act of congress authorizing the construction of a toll bridge across the Columbia river between Longview, Wash., and Rainier, Ore., will be tested by the port of Portland commission in an attempt to bring the case before the United States supreme court by such means as laws and procedure require.

The determination to institute legal steps was reached at a meeting of the port commission today. Authority was voted to retain attorneys to join Gus C. Moser, counsel for the commission, in the preparation and presentation of the case.

The right of congress to delegate authority to individuals to enter the waters of a sovereign state and construct a bridge for gain, and question as to the necessity for such a bridge, which it is asserted, congress has not shown exists; and the right of congress to delegate power for building a bridge from the standpoint of convenience, are among points discussed as within the scope of those that can be raised.

It was said at the meeting today that when the port presented the case at the Washington hearing last month it was not opposed to the bridge as long as it was of proper construction, high enough and with sufficient horizontal clearance and did not cause the port to be discriminated against. Equal and competitive treatment with other ports as to bridge clearances was asked for, but it was declared today that the port of Portland did not receive that.

W. D. B. Dodson, manager of the Portland chamber of commerce, received a telegram from Senator McNary in Washington, D. C., today asking what Portland's next move would be on the Longview bridge controversy.

constructed English.

It opened:

"Dear Brother: I received your letter requesting more leprosy germs which I will send at once by the same party I sent the others by. I took those from a man who died of the disease lately."

In the letter sent to Mexico City and returned undelivered, Nash says he had recently returned from Russia. In the letter to Vladivostok, signed "Your Comrade, Commissar-Chek-10 by L." it is asserted: "We have noticed considerable ammunition, being shipped to China which we will send full report from our San Francisco office." The bulk of this letter deals with lumber and grain movements, commercial items, and with the letter was found a newspaper clipping of the recent purchase of 10,000 sheep in Oregon by the Soviet government.

Scientific Knowledge Shown
There are letters also showing technical knowledge of radio and photography, couched in terms of these sciences. One such letter was addressed to Berlin, Germany. The "leprosy" letter, as police describe it, provided the greatest sensation among investigators today.

The letter was found on a table in a cafeteria several days ago. The waitress finding it put it in a garbage can. Later Nash returned and asked the girl for it. When she told him she had thrown it away he was considerably agitated and asked her if she had read it. She told him she had not and he went away she said, seemingly relieved. Then the girl retrieved

the letter, read it, and ten minutes later, turned it over to police.

Nash was arrested today.

"20 Girls Already"

Portions of the letter follow:

"The party that you mentioned about coming there to give the germs to the people is on the boat on his way."

"You must have a lot of enemies in the United States. I do not blame you for giving them this disease. It is the only way to play even with the American Yanks—(in which Americans are villainous)."

"Your sister in Portland wrote me that she had given 20 girls this disease already."

"Why don't you put some of those germs around the M-N so if the officers open up the packages they will contract this disease. You may as well as I know that it is only the poor boob who the law regulates in the land of the Yank so why have any respect for persons or laws."

"Very Easily Contracted"

"You say you want to give it to about 220 people. Well, that is not very many. It is very easily contracted, just by rubbing against."

"I have also sent some of the anthrax germs. These will make people go blind in a few years. It takes less than three to seven years to show up so you will be away by that time."

Police say it is possible the letter may be the product of a diseased mind. On the other hand, they say, there is no doubt but that Nash wrote the letters, one of which is known to have been mailed, and there is likewise no doubt but that he received the ones police have read.

Carries Dread Disease

Nash is himself a victim of a disease, which, while in its final stage, is as malignant as the much dreaded leprosy. He contracted it, he said, in an army camp. He told police he had been taking treatment in the free dispensary here.

While a mere cursory examination was made of Nash's room here, and several letters were taken, police investigators said they considered it highly ill-advised to make a further search of the room until it had been disinfected, in view of the great danger of infection from the disease from which Nash is suffering. It is said to be in an advanced form.

On this grim structure women were taken from upper windows, men were saved from roofs and death was cheated of at least some of its victims with the very tools of death.

Coffins were again used to serve the living when a messenger got to Waterbury. He not only got food, but he was able to give instructions how to get it to Bolton.

Food in water tight containers was lashed to the raft and the water in the river having by then gone down sufficiently to permit, was floated 10 miles downstream to Bolton where the residents, seeing its approach, cheered the symbol of death that for a second time had saved their lives.

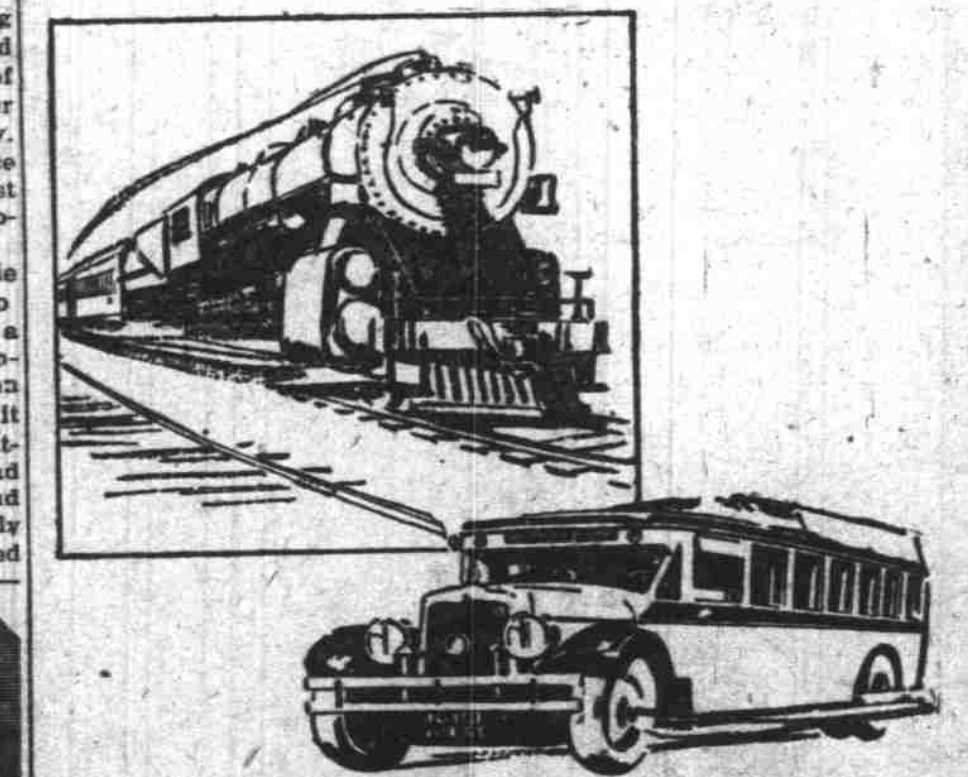
