#### PART-TIME PLAN MAY BECOME GENERAL, PREDICTED

A change in the American educational system is gradually taking place to meet the present conditions when hordes of youth are clamoring each year for admittance to the high schools and colleges, declared R. W. Tavenner, assistant principal of the senior high school in an address before the Kiwanis club luncheon yesterday.

It may follow the Cincinnati plan, said Mr. Tavenner, where students spend two weeks in a school and then two weeks in a shop, thus making possible productive work to pay the bills.

Shall the great American experiment of free education for everyone continue in the question which faces the people, he said. No other country in the world has a system so extensive.
