WEATHER REPORTS INDICATE WINTER Dispatches From Far and Near Show Signs of Approaching Storms SEATTLE, Nov. 12.—(AP)—Snow and freezing temperatures were reported from parts of Washington and British Columbia today. In northeastern and north central Washington snow as deep as nine inches was reported. British Columbia points saw their first snowfall of the year. Along coastal Washington, rain was general, with forecasts of a gale that might endanger shipping.

CROWD CELEBRATES ARMISTICE SIGNING Program At Independence Appropriate; Roy Hewitt Delivers Address INDEPENDENCE, Nov. 12.—(Special)—A large crowd attended the Armistice day celebration in this city, Dallas and Mountbelling fully represented. A special train was run from Valsets for the accommodation of people from Valsets and intervening points. The afternoon program at the Isis theatre was well attended and the speaker, Roy Hewitt, was received with round applause. The football game between Dallas and Independence was the principal drawing card of the day. The game was fast and furious, both teams vying on the track. The crowd swayed and cheered. Independence made a touchdown and it looked like the game was going to end that way but in the last few minutes Dallas boys rallied and evened the score, 6 to 6. No more scores could be counted, so the game was announced. This will be played off later to see which team gets the silver cup. A free supper was served to Legion men and families in the I. O. O. F. hall at 5:30 p. m. This was well patronized.

Earth Shocks Reported From Points Far Apart WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—(AP)—A sharp earthquake, estimated to have occurred about 4700 miles from Washington, direction unknown, was registered tonight on the seismograph of Georgetown university. Director Tondorf said the tremors began at 5:18 p. m., and lasted more than an hour. BARSAN, Asiatic Turkey, Nov. 12.—(AP)—Several earth tremors were felt here and in neighboring sections about 6 o'clock this evening. The shocks were not strong and no damage has thus far been reported.
