BETTER FIRE PROTECTION

Salem will have better fire protection. That was decided at the election when a special millage tax was voted— And this will eventually result in three additional fire stations, north, south and east.

But this tax will at first bring only a little over \$30,000 a year, and that will not go all the way in providing one new station, for the land must be acquired, the building erected, and at least one pumper provided—and the pumper will cost around \$16,500. In fact, each new station ought to have also a combination chemical engine, and other equipment.

These three new stations are needed now. But it seems to be out of the question to get them soon.

Is there not some way to acquire the site for the north station, at least, and perhaps also erect the building, on a plan of future payments? And perhaps part of the cost of the equipment, too?

What is in the way of this?

The selection of Mark D. McCallister as corporation commissioner is a good one. He will operate the department without an assistant commissioner, which place he has held. He will arrange close connection with all law enforcing agencies, and thus increase the efficiency of the office. As assistant commissioner he has had charge of the business of the 45 building and loan companies in the state, with \$23,000,000 assets, an increase of \$3,000,000 in the past year; besides that of the outside companies. Mr. McCallister has been long connected with this office, and he understands every detail of its duties. He is a native of the state, and one of its fine, upstanding men in every walk of life.

APPLE SYRUP RIVAL OF MAPLE SYRUP

Since the annual apple Slogan number of The Statesman of last Thursday was published, a lot of new ideas have been advanced concerning the uses and superior qualities of this king of the fruits— In prose and in poetry.

Now comes another. It is apple syrup; better than maple syrup. The idea comes from the Oregon Agricultural college and is in a current bulletin of the department of industrial journalism of that institution, and, coming from such an authoritative source, no doubt good cooks throughout the country will be trying it out. The idea may conceivably increase the market for apples, throughout this country, and other countries. Here is the idea as set out in the bulletin: "Apple syrup is a product of Oregon apples resembling corn or maple syrup in appearance but greatly superior to them in flavor and palatability. It is made by neutralizing the acid in fresh cider with calcium carbonate (obtained at any drug store) at the rate of five ounces to fourteen gallons of cider and then boiling, according to the department of horticultural products at the Oregon Agricultural college.

"Action of the calcium carbonate causes a precipitate which is allowed to settle for six or eight hours before the liquid is poured into kettles. A teaspoon of calcium carbonate again is added and the juice is boiled down to a seventh of its original volume, when it has the appearance of maple syrup. The suspended matter settles while the syrup cools. The product can be poured into either glass jars or tin cans. Before sealing the syrup is sterilized by boiling for twelve minutes."

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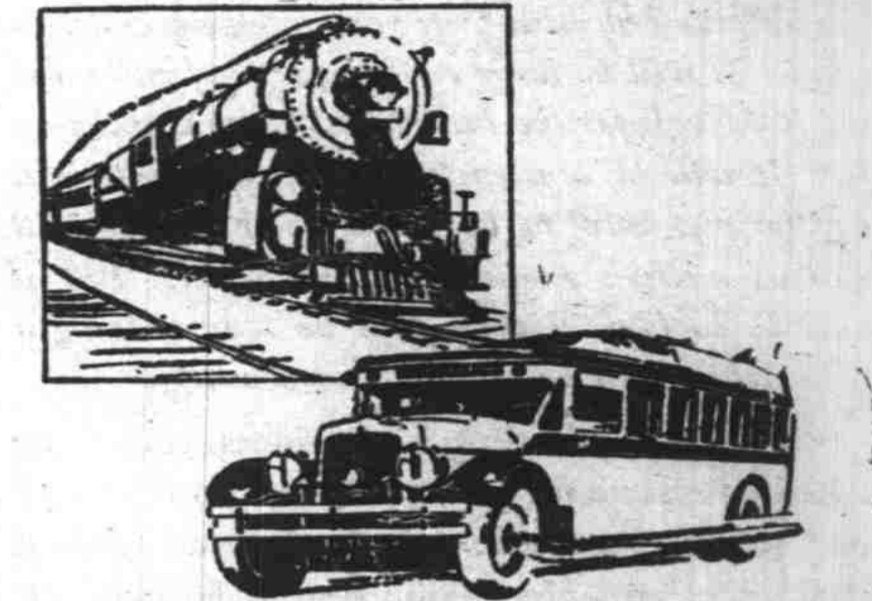
