CONGRESS SESSION VERY PEACEFUL ONE

Legislators Mostly Take Saturday Afternoon Off To Go Elsewhere

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—(AP)—Belying momentarily the signs and portents that have forecast a session torn by legislative and political storm, the new congress ended its first week tonight wearing an air of confident serenity. While the senate was taking a day off, the house opened its Saturday deliberations in a spirit of perfect fellowship by greeting and honoring Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh. Gathered in unexpectantly from a nearby corridor, bustling and almost overwhelmed, he ace of aviators was welcomed to an informal reception at the speaker's rostrum, and unanimously voted a congressional medal of honor. Then the members returned to the tax reduction bill, now passing through the earlier, duller stages of its legislative journey, and occupied the remainder of the day exchanging statistics across the party aisle.

counted noses. Many such Saturday afternoons are used by members to catch up with work at their offices, and regular weekend trips to their homes have not been unknown among representatives who live in nearby stations. But if there was little agitation on the surface as the week came to its end, there was plenty of dynamite underneath. The new congress now has technically before it all of these legislative subjects which will furnish the fighting points of the session. The McNary-Haugen bill, in slightly different form, came back to the senate's waiting list yesterday with Senator McNary's name again affixed to it, and the Curtis-Crisp bill of last session again was presented today in the house. Appropriations and taxes already are in the process of actual consideration, and the flood relief problem is just around the corner. A "Missouri plan" for flood control was added to the calendar today when Representative Dyer put in a bill like that presented yesterday by his fellow resident of St. Louis, Senator Hawes, proposing appropriation of a round billion dollars in place of the less than \$500,000,000 suggested by President Coolidge.
