disastrous flood in the spring of this year, gave a wonderfully clear idea of the ability of the Red Cross.

In the Mississippi flood there were ninety-two counties in six different states under water for from three to eight weeks. One million persons were driven from their homes. Some of these were taken care of by relatives and friends but the majority relied on the relief work done by the Red Cross. More than six-hundred thousand were clothed, housed, and fed during this period of several months. Fifty-thousand are still being cared for.

Another interesting fact which Dr. DeKleine brought out in his illuminating talk was that, contrary to expectations, there was less sickness following the flood than there had been at any time in a period of five years among the inhabitants of the inundated area. One-thousand people were immunized for typhoid and one-fourth of that number for small-pox. Two tons of quinine were distributed to the people as a preventive of malaria.

Six-million dollars was contributed by the American people and the entire amount was used in actual relief work. The salaries of the officials and overhead expenses are paid from the Red Cross treasury which is made up from the yearly roll call.


The meeting Saturday was not a social meeting but aside from the talk given by Dr. DeKleine was devoted entirely to business. Mrs. Walter L. Spaulding gave a report of the bazaar sponsored two weeks ago by the hospital division of the club. Two-hundred and two dollars was realized. One-half the amount will be deposited in the club building fund and the remainder will be given to the Salem General Hospital.
