SPEED IS NEEDED. There is need for speed in getting the bond and stock canvass for the Oregon Lumber Mills, Inc., over.

For Salem's reputation for doing things is at stake. And the growth of this city and section is tied up largely in the success of this institution.

There are prospects, and even promises, sufficient to get the thing done. Why lag? Why delay?

Make that mill a going concern, with a well rounded production, and paying a profit, and specialty mills will follow.

But they cannot afford to come unless backed up by a going concern able to give them their raw materials of the right kinds, and to keep on furnishing them year after year.

That is, their linen yarn of the proper lea or fineness and consistency, and texture.

Another day? Mills looking this way will employ several. They will double the population of Salem.

SPICY READING. Thursday's issue of the Oregon Statesman brought a whiff of spicy fragrance from the mint fields of Marion county.

Reading of the new refinery which extracts the essential oil from the 130,000 pounds of mint grown this year on 3500 acres; of the promising future of the mint industry, the excellent quality of the Oregon product and the high standards in the world's market, the reader is so enthralled that he seems actually to smell the pungent mint leaves.

At the power of suggestion that translates the story to the eye, to the more subtle lure of the nostrils, but a note in the editorial column. This is no psychological miracle, but a bit of propaganda on the part of the Statesman.

The Statesman's good habit of devote two pages each to the promotion of some local product or industry. This is the mint issue, and we look forward to the onion issue with some apprehension.

By and by, the mint ink is a mighty good publicity stunt. We congratulate the Statesman on a fertility of invention commensurate with the fertility of the mint field.

The Statesman is thankful to the Portland Telegram for the number which will be February 9th; for a promise.

There is a little mint education; this is a difference between a mint and a peppermint oil refinery. But let that pass.

There is a tip: The consummation of the dream of a peppermint oil refinery in Salem means this: It means that there has been begun the development of a gigantic drug industry for the Willamette valley, and in that valley there will be about 58 essential oils besides peppermint oil. There will be more than enough of these spicy ingredients to furnish the scent of one of them to all of the 52 Slogan issues of The Statesman each year, with about seven to spare.

And the \$500,000 cash crop of this valley for peppermint oil this year (half of it coming to Marion county growers) will increase to several millions; and the returns for the other essential oils will mount to many millions, for some of

them bring much higher prices than are paid for oil of peppermint.

And there will be rose and other perfumes; even attar of roses.

And there will be the drugs made from leaves and seeds and barks and roots and gums and mosses and grasses, etc., etc.

High authorities now KNOW, by actual experiments, by accurate weights and measures and tests, that Salem is the coming crude drug center of the world, by right of her peculiar qualities of soil and showers and sunshine. Even the salt mists of the Pacific put iodine into our loganberries and make the free use of them in the dietary proof against the goiter.

The first day's issue of the Congressional Record, giving a report of the business of congress of Monday, the 5th, was nearly all taken up with a record of the bills introduced in the house. Over 65 of the 102 pages of the Record were thus taken up; and the majority of the bills were for increases of pensions; many hundreds of them.
