

Details of New Plan for High School Grid Title Made Known Here

HIGH SCORE BASIS MEETS OPPOSITION

A printed copy of the high school football championship scheme proposed by officials of The Dalles high school was received by Principal J. C. Nelson, of Salem high, yesterday. The scheme is being sent all over the state for consideration prior to the state meeting.

"Each year we spill quantities of very good air, waste a lot of printers' ink and use up considerable energy in proclaiming the merits of this or that football team and in claiming rather promiscuously the mythical and elusive state championship," writes Superintendent C. W. Boetticher, in urging serious thought for his proposition.

"Simplicity in application and operation, freedom in contracting with other schools, safeguarding the financial side of the sport, and working out the championship honor with the least possible number of games are chief and important points in the plan."

The scheme proposed in brief awards the title on the basis of high scores, with the state divided into an eastern and western section. The complete scheme follows:

1. The constitution, by laws and precedents of the O. H. S. A. are to govern as heretofore except as below.

2. For convenience, the state is divided into an eastern and a western section. The Cascade Mountain range to be the boundary line.

3. The membership of the association is divided into two divisions. All schools with 250 or more students shall be in division one, all with less than 250 shall be in division two. The scheme provides for a championship in each division.

4. All schools wishing to contend for the championship must register their intention with the board of control, October 1st of each year. The secretary of the board shall give each school so registered a certificate to that effect.

5. Each school registering as a championship contender shall pay the secretary-treasurer a fee of \$5 in addition to the regular membership fee.

6. A school in the lower division wishing to contend in the upper division may do so by registering in that division as provided for above and shall pay a fee of \$10, but no school shall register in both divisions, nor shall a school in the upper division be permitted to register in the lower.

7. Each school contending for the championship shall play not more than five games, during the regular season, with other schools contending for state honors. However, the board of control may authorize fewer than five if it deems advisable, but must make its decision known by October 10th each year.

8. Any school in either division may play any other school as heretofore, but only scores with schools registered for the championship shall be counted. Games won or lost with schools not registered for the championship shall have no bearing whatever in determining final honor.

No registered team shall be considered eligible for championship after being defeated by another registered team whatever its total score. However such defeat shall not affect the standing of the losing team in the championship conference in any other way.

9. In any game of registered teams the difference between the score of the winning team and the losing team shall be the score counted in favor of the winning team as part of its total score.

10. The school winning the largest total score in this manner

shall be considered division champion.

12. The board of control shall settle the scores in any manner mutually agreeable to the schools concerned. It shall also sanction and arrange for a game between the winners in each section of the state and in each division of registered schools. These final games shall end the season and the winner in each shall be declared state champion.

Several high school principals including Superintendent of Schools Miller of Milton have expressed disapproval of the plan submitted by The Dalles, contending that the premium on points scored would influence coaches always to keep their best men in the lineup and give the benefit of football training only to a few players. It is believed to be one which will merit much consideration at the state meeting, however, as the district plan for financial reasons is believed to be impracticable.

A long multigraphed summary of correspondence between The Dalles, the state board of control, and Medford and McLoughlin high schools concerning the arrangement of post-season games was received at Salem high school yesterday. It was sent from The Dalles to all high schools in the state in an attempt to show that the Columbia river school was deliberately side-stepped and ignored, after having been practically promised a game against McLoughlin high for the east Oregon title.

From the correspondence, it appears that the crux of the whole difficulty lies in the fact that some members of the board of control apparently issued a statement, either consciously or not, to the effect that The Dalles had "with-drawn" from consideration as a title contender, leaving the way open for arranging the Medford-McLoughlin game. This statement had never been authorized by The Dalles and was promptly protested, but the protest was completely ignored, according to Superintendent Boetticher. A later report from Secretary Cannon stated that the protest was ignored because the game was not for the championship.

"Now if, as Mr. Cannon stated the game did not involve the championship, were the rules of the association observed? And if the championship was involved, did Medford meet the right team? We are not trying to detract from the calibre of the Medford team, but we do contend that to award the championship to Medford on the basis of the game played at Milton would be an injustice to us. We were certainly designated by the board as logical contenders for the championship of our section and were deliberately side-stepped," the summary reads in part.

Passage of a resolution at the

state meeting last year to the effect that no championship high school football game should be played in 1927 did not invalidate the existing association rules and will not swerve several high school principals from raising a rampus at the meeting December 30, Principal J. C. Nelson said yesterday. The association constitution and by-laws are the working regulations of the organization and cannot be violated. If it was planned not to hold a championship game last fall, a change in the rules should have been made, the belief is.

Principal Nelson also received a letter yesterday from Secretary Cannon reviling the Salem school head for raising the matter of the association rule, and charging that poor sportsmanship had been shown.

"We may go to bat at the state meeting. If we do, I shall take the same argument I have presented and if there is a vote of lack of confidence, I shall consider myself spanked," the letter read in part.

Principal Nelson expressed surprise at the tone of Cannon's letter.

"I believe Cannon is getting rattled," he said. "I have nothing against Cannon personally, and I have not dealt with personalities in this matter. I am concerned with the sanctity of association rules, and will defend them at the state meeting."
