## Federated Woman's Club of Oregon Consider Legislative Measures

Mrs. Leander Martin, legislative chairman of the Oregon Federation of Women's Clubs, is calling the attention of presidents and legislative chairmen of the various federated clubs throughout the state to certain legislative measures whose principles have long had the consideration of the General Federation of Women's Clubs. These measures will be introduced into the 70th congress convened on December fifth. She asks that the chairmen send to their senators or representatives and obtain copies of these measures and make a study of them. The measures relate to the following bills and subjects: Flood control, education, the great lakes through the Gulf of St. Lawrence waterway; the Cooper-Ketcham bill, amendment of the census law, that the designation "home-maker" be given to every woman caring for a home; the Cooper bill, the establishment in the public health service of a nurses' corps, uniform marriage and divorce law; legislation which concerns the American Indian.


