WHIPPET PRICES NAMED Prices Drop From \$90 to \$200 On Different Models TOLEDO, Ohio, Jan. 4.—(AP)—John N. Willys, president of Willys Overland, last night announced reductions ranging from \$90 to \$200 on the various models of Whippet cars. He said the new prices were the lowest in the history of the organization and placed the Whippet on a directly competitive basis with the lowest priced cars in the field. The new prices range from \$455 for the touring model to \$585 for the four door sedan. The two door sedan and the coupe will be \$535. The roadster without rumble seat \$485 and with rumble seat \$525. The great reduction \$200, was made in the convertible coupe, which was cut to \$545. The lowest price for that model in any line on the market.

YANKS EXPECT REBEL ATTACK FROM SANDINO already at Puerto Cabezas, former seat of the Sacaca liberal government, with 14 officers, 280 blue jackets and 98 marines. In addition she is carrying 52 marines from the Galveston, which is remaining at Balboa. The Tulsa carries 11 officers 154 enlisted men, and 26 marines. No further official reports were available at the navy department today as to the status of the situation in northwestern Nicaragua where the marines and Nicaraguan guardsmen are endeavoring to rout the rebels headed by General Sandino.

Reinforcements Sent SAN DIEGO, Cal., Jan. 4.—(AP)—Orders to organize three infantry companies, a machine gun and Howitzer company and a battalion headquarters, and to dispatch this battalion to Nicaragua from San Diego on the submarine tender Argonne, now here, not later than January 9, were received from Washington today by Colonel Charles Lyman, commander of the local marine base. The marine detachment of 100 men originally scheduled to sail from here next Saturday on the transport Henderson, for Hawaii, had its orders cancelled and instead it will go to Nicaragua on the Argonne. Orders sending eight marine corps officers to China on the Henderson also were revoked and the officers ordered to Central America.
