WRITER AGREES WITH PARENTS



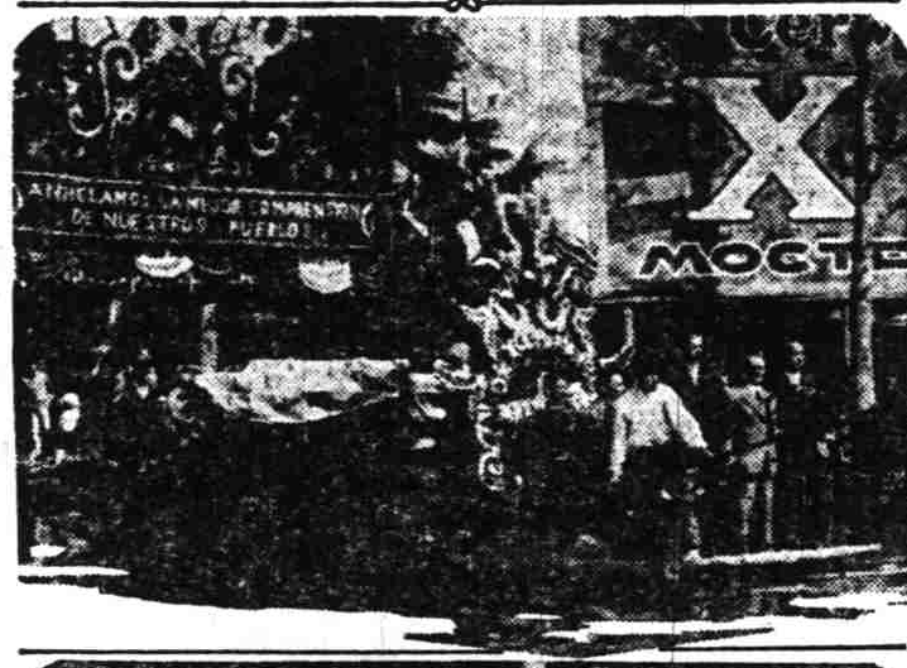

EINSTEIN, RELATIVELY SPEAKING



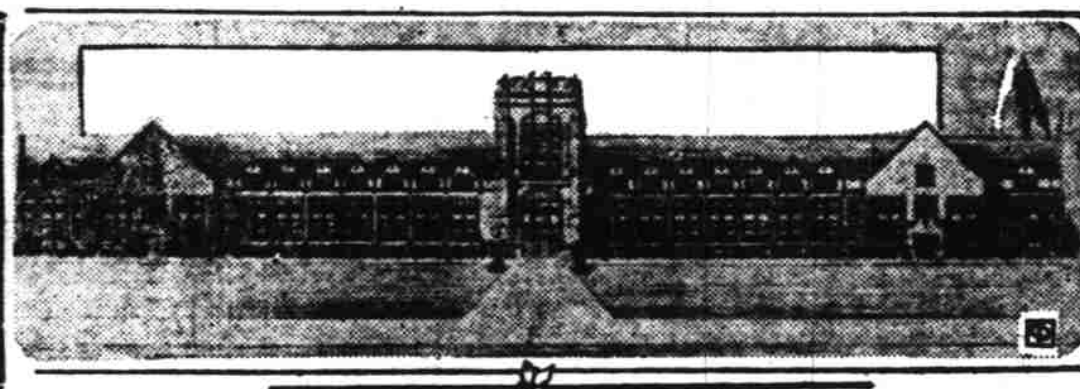

CANOE CARRIES LINDY TO FETE



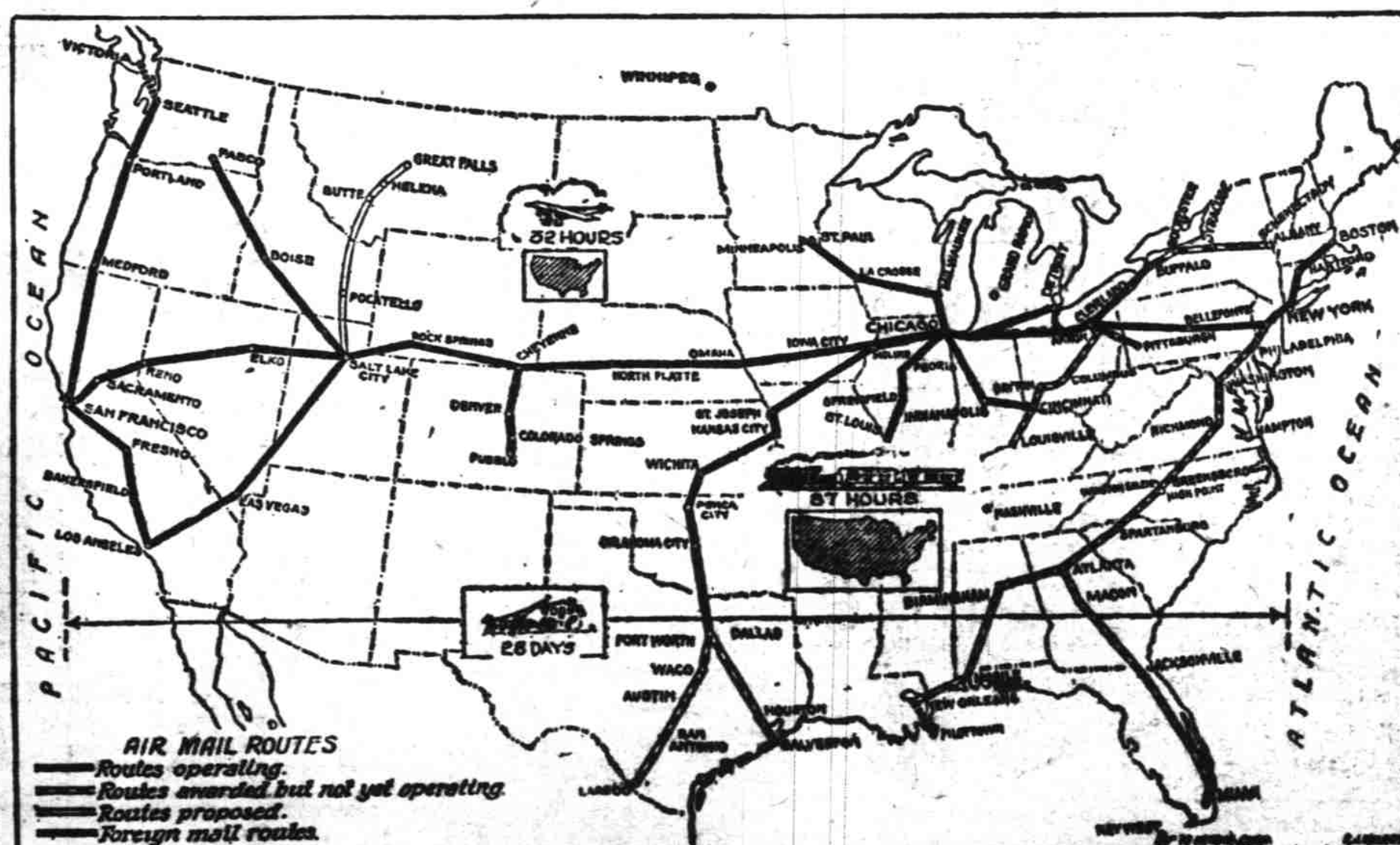

TRIUMVIRATE RULES BILLION DOLLAR CORPORATION



James A. Farrell, 64, as president of the U. S. Steel Corporation, is the second of the triumvirate guiding the destinies of the organization. He is known as a worker. Farrell rose from the ranks, beginning his career as a laborer in a steel wire mill at New Haven, Conn., at 16. Farrell is also a director of a number of corporations, including the American Bridge Company.



J. Pierpont Morgan, new chairman of the board of the U. S. Steel Corporation, has been head of J. P. Morgan and Company since 1913, when he succeeded his father. He is a director of many corporations, chief among which are the Aetna Insurance Company, Discount Corporation of New York, International Mercantile Marine Company, the Pullman Company, U. S. Steel and others. Morgan is 60.



Myron C. Taylor, new chairman of the finance committee of the U. S. Steel Corporation, is the third member of the triumvirate named to run the \$2,500,000,000 corporation. He began practicing law in New York in 1894, later becoming identified with the cotton textile industry, building up various textile companies through consolidations. He is a director of railroads, banks and other corporations.

OUTLIVES REIGN OF THREE KINGS



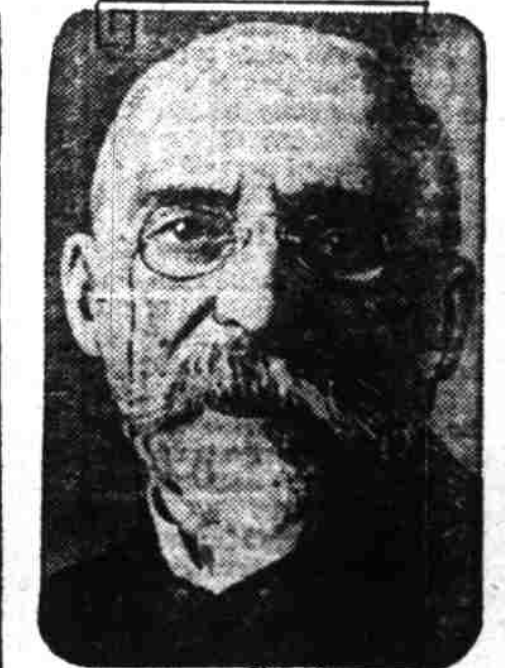
