

"CHINESE PARROT" BOSWORTH VEHICLE

Hobart Bosworth, who received the impetus of his picture career on the Universal lot, again returns to his old love, this time to portray a dual role in "The Chinese Parrot," a Jewell feature release, directed by Paul Leni, which comes to the Capitol theater today, Monday and Tuesday.

Back in 1915, when Carl Laemmle, president of Universal Pictures, was bearing the brunt of a heated battle for supremacy in the motion picture industry, Bosworth was signed for a year's work in a special group of six-reelers in which the noted screen star was to be featured.

His first picture was "Fatherhood," a western drama. The second, more realistic epic was filmed as the "Scarlet Sin," featuring Bosworth as a minister, in which the first dissolve picture of Christ was filmed. It was in this production that Jane Novak, Maude George, and Jack Hoxie received their big "break" in the picture business.

Later Bosworth appeared in the "Iron Hand" which had been rewritten, first being filmed as "Tainted Money." His next, "Little Brother of the Rich" and "Colorado" were produced with as great success. He also appeared in "Two Men of Sandy Bar," in which Emory Johnson, now one of the most promising directors at Universal, played a juvenile lead role.

"Yaqui," his greatest play brought more international comment and criticism than any. It was written around the terrorization and privation existent among the Yaqui Indians and Bosworth played the role of one of the tribesmen, the first white man to portray a redekin for the movies.

Of course, Bosworth has appeared in Universal productions several times in recent years, one of his most recent characterizations being in "Spangles."

"The Chinese Parrot" gives Bosworth another opportunity to portray his undisputed histrionic skill. Other notables in the cast of this picture, screen version of Earl Derr Biggers' novel, which appeared in serial form in the Saturday Evening Post, are Marjorie Nixon, Edmund Burns, Florence Turner, Capt. Albert Conti, Sejin, G. Kuwa, Anna May Wong, Fred Esmelton, Edgar Kennedy, Slim Summerville and others.

S. T. G. When will I marry?

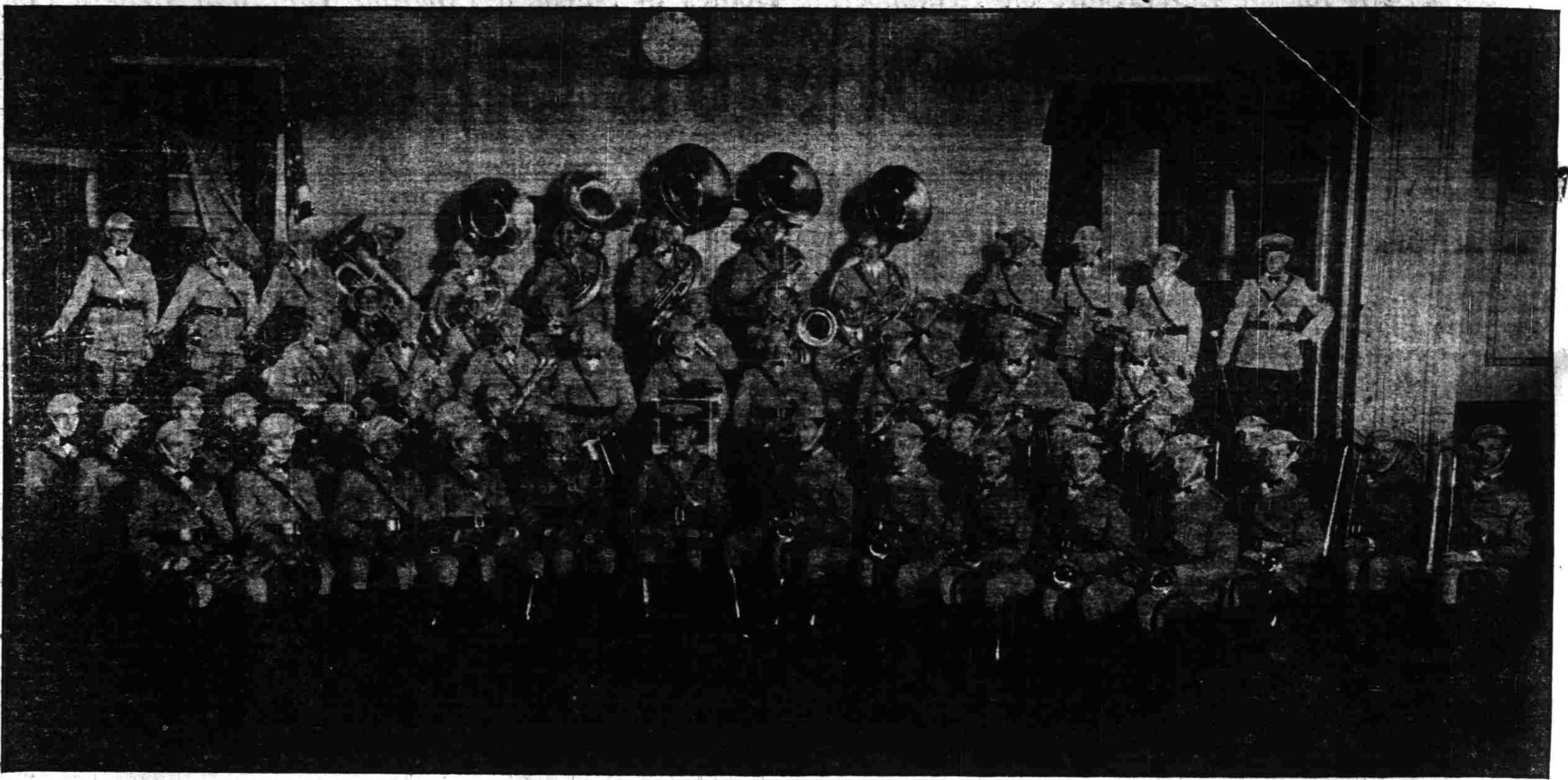

American Legion Band From Albany Coming to Capitol Wednesday



MARY LEWIS COMES TO ELSINORE SOON

"Bravo! Greater than Jeritza!" These vociferous words or their Teutonic equivalent shot up above the din and fairly smote the rafters of the National Opera House in Vienna at the expiration of the debut of a brand new Marguerite in "Faust" a few years ago.

On the stage in the full flush of initial success stood a stunner American novice, a young



American girl who a short two years previously in the farthest most standing room of the Metropolitan Opera House, New York had gazed open mouthed, at the bright scintillating star to whom she was now being compared. That was the moment when determination to some day tread the same stage was born in Mary Lewis's heart and the accomplishment of that dream came in January 1926 when her debut was made at the New York Opera House.

"Mary Lewis was instant triumph at Metropolitan," headlined the New York Evening World on the occasion of her debut in New York, editorials were printed on her success, and coast to coast telegraph wires hummed with the story of the female protagonist of the old time Horatio Alger stories.

"A charming voice, the possession of it seemingly unaffected, and with her program of songs there was nothing to be desired either in pitch, timbre, ability or generosity; the latter being marked by a rare unselfishness" was the opinion of the Dayton, (Ohio) Daily News critic on the occasion of Miss Lewis' recital there on her first coast to coast tour. So not only has she triumphed in Europe, but also in New York, but also in San Francisco, and many cities between from the Gulf to Canada, Mary Lewis' radiant smile, unaffected manner, and beautiful voice never fails to thrill her audience. Her local concert on January 22 at Elsinore theater will undoubtedly add many new admirers to her already long list.

The American Legion Military Band of Albany, Oregon, will appear in concert at Bligh's Capitol theater next Wednesday evening as an added attraction with the feature picture "The First Auto."

This band with its eighty-four members is one of the largest in America. Its members are ex-army, navy and marine corps musicians, sixty two of them will participate in the Salem concert. The organizers, W. Bert Stevens, director and L. J. Bell, manager used two world famous bands as examples: the Garde Republicans Band of France and the Royal Artillery Band of England. In March formation the big Legion band is like the famous French band with its advance corps of buglers while in concert formation it is similar to the Royal Artillery band of England being instrumental as both a full military band and high class orchestra. Under the direction of Mr. Stevens, a musician of note, the band has made remarkable progress and with a definite schedule outlined it will be a great asset to the American Legion of Oregon at both state and national conventions hereafter.

Added features in the Capitol concert will be vocal and instrumental soloists accompanied by the band and the overseas quartet. This quartet entertained the boys over there and have been singing together ever since all are members of the band. The majority of concert patrons will hear for the first time that wonderful new instrument, the electric vibraphone played by Mr. C. Palmer, xylophone and tympani artist. The band is completely outfitted in snappy military uniforms of blue and gold.

HOSS STILL IN RACE

EDITORIAL FIELD MAN JOB DECLINED, STATES

The position of field manager of the Oregon State Editorial association will not tempt Hal E. Hoss, private secretary to Governor Patterson, to retire from the race for secretary of the state at the republican primary election.

This was announced by Mr. Hoss Saturday after he had received a number of letters commenting on recent reports that he had decided to retire from politics to accept the editorial association offer.

Mr. Hoss said that he had been requested to accept the position of field director for the state editorial association, but that he had declined at a conference held at Eugene a month ago. This conference was attended by Eric Allen, in charge of the university journalism school, and other men prominent in newspaper circles in Oregon. It was reported that the position of field manager for the editorial association would carry a salary in excess of \$5000 a year, as against \$3000 received by Mr. Hoss as private secretary to the governor.

Reports received in Salem today indicated that John Carkin of Medford is considering the proposal to make the race for secretary of state, and it is likely that he will make a formal announcement later this month. He served as speaker of the house of representatives during the last legislative session and has a wide acquaintance throughout the state.

Other persons mentioned prominently in connection with the office of secretary of state are H. H. Corey, member of the public service commission; Carl Abrams, secretary of the state board of control, and Linn Jones of Oregon City.

In event Mr. Hoss should be successful in receiving the nomination for secretary of state at the primary election, he probably would resign as private secretary to the governor sometime next May.

USE NEW TERMINAL

OREGON STAGES MOVE TO SENATOR SOTEL BUILDING

The Oregon Stages Inc., yesterday moved their stage depot and general terminal facilities to the new Senator hotel. They were formerly located in the Terminal hotel building. In addition to the Oregon Stages Inc., there are several other lines that will use the new depot, including the Ham-

mond line, Parker and Pickwick stages.

Entrance for the stages is on the High street side. The drive-out is located on the opposite side of the building, buses emerging into the alley and from there onto either Court or Chemeketa streets. Special space has been provided for about 10 large buses at the rear of the depot. The collection that existed in the former location is admirably avoided in the new location.

The new Senator Hotel, the formal opening of which will take place later in the month, is modern in all respects. It has 111 rooms, 32 with private bath and 24 with showers. Practically all are equipped with lavatory. The rooms are furnished in the very latest and best designs in furniture and equipment. The blankets for the beds have been purchased from the Pendleton Woolen mills.

Practically all of the concessions have moved from the Terminal to the Senator. The Terminal cafe has been combined with the Food Shop, formerly located on South High street. The fixtures of the latter place will be used. The cafe will be operated by Mr. and Mrs. Lalier Cline.

Announcement of the hotel opening will be made later, but at present only about one-third of the rooms have been furnished.

NEW CARRIER BUILT

STEAMSHIP SARATOGA JOIN PACIFIC FLEET

PHILADELPHIA, January 7.—(A P)—The U. S. S. Saratoga, new giant airplane carrier of the navy, passed the Delaware Capes and out to sea Friday on her maiden voyage, which will carry her to New England and later to Puget Sound where she will join the Pacific fleet in May.

It took a fleet of seven tugs 57 minutes today to warp the 888 foot vessel from her dock at the Philadelphia navy yard and into the channel in the Delaware river.

It was the first time the Saratoga, on the flying deck of which the largest airplanes can land safely, had cruised entirely under her own power. The fleet of tugs conveyed her through the vast fields of floating ice to the capes to be of assistance in case she should ground in the river channel.

The huge ship will proceed to Hampton Roads for ammunition

and bombs and then go to Newport, R. I., for torpedoes. From there she will go to the Panama Canal Zone where 25 pilots are expected to practice flying from her immense flying deck.

Naval authorities here said the newly commissioned airplane carrier was expected to pass through the canal about February 6.

"DADDY" LONGWORTH DIES

LONDON, Jan. 7.—(A P)—David Carrick Longworth, known affectionately to the older generation in America and England as "Daddy" Longworth, died Friday at the age of 75. Longworth came from Addison, Ohio, forty years ago and became well known as "the pupil of Barnum," in London. He was globe trotter, big game hunter, actor, journalist, and prince of "stunt advertisers."
