SMITH DENIES MRS. SNYDER LAST APPEAL (Continued from page 1.)

counsel for Mrs. Snyder and Gray admitted that their clients had unquestionably killed Albert Snyder, art editor, but argued that they might have been so emotionally diseased that they were incapable of doing right even though they recognized the difference between right and wrong.

"I have searched in vain for any basis which my conscience, in the light of my oath of office will approve, on which I might temper the law with mercy," he continued. "Up to this writing there is no extenuation shown for what the seven judges of the court of appeals, in agreement with the 12 jurors and the trial justice, have found to be a deliberate and premeditated murder committed by these defendants."

Death Occurs Thursday—With the governor's decision it seemed almost certain that the condemned pair would die in the electric chair Thursday. While Mrs. Snyder's attorneys were in disagreement as to whether they should appeal to the federal courts for a writ of habeas corpus, there was no indication that any further effort would be made to save Gray.

The governor said the case had received his anxious consideration, not merely since the hearing upon the application for executive clemency but since their conviction was unanimously affirmed by the court of appeals November 22.

OSGING, N. Y. Jan. 10.—(AP)—There was the tenseness of approaching doom about Sing Sing prison tonight with only two days left before the scheduled execution of Mrs. Ruth Snyder and Henry Judd Gray.

Both prisoners were visited by their mothers and Gray by his wife, the first time that the latter has gone to the death house and probably the last. Other occupants of the death cells were not allowed to have visitors nor will they be until after the electrocution.

Both Mrs. Snyder and Gray were said to be in good health, Warden Lawes announced that they would be given no narcotics to deaden their sensibilities at the time of their ordeal.

Gray was said to be resigned to his fate but Mrs. Snyder still had one slender hope, an application for a writ of habeas corpus on the ground that in being tried jointly with Gray for the murder of her husband, her constitutional rights had been denied her. It was expected that this application would be filed in New York tomorrow, bearing Mrs. Snyder's own signature so that if it should be granted she would have to be taken from the death house to court for the hearing.

without the most careful consideration and investigation. "We would respectfully suggest to the Salem church that instead of listening to this man's plausible explanation of his own conduct, and to credentials that are without value because they could not be reproduced today, that they do a little real investigation of Mr. Payne's ministerial career. Moreover, we issue the following challenge to the gentleman in question himself, namely, that he discard his sheaf of outworn credentials and secure now and present to the Salem church, or to any other creditable body, bona fide certificates of present standing from any of the following persons or organizations:

"1. From the officials of the Baptist State Conventions or General Associations of any of the states in which he has held pastorates, namely: Oklahoma, Kentucky, Florida, and Missouri.

"2. From the church board of any church that he has ever served.

"3.—From any of the general ministerial bodies of any of the above mentioned states.

"4. From the Baptist state papers of any of the above states, more especially from Dr. Masters of the "Western Recorder," or from Dr. R. K. Maiden or Dr. S. M. Brown of the "Word and Way."

"5. From the faculty of William Jewell College, his former school, or from its former president, Dr. J. P. Greene, now living at Santa Anna, California.

"6. From Dr. M. P. Hunt, of Louisville, Ky., who launched him into the ministry, and whose name he has printed upon a "credential" which he has used extensively in Oregon; from Dr. C. M. Chme, of from his "old schoolmate," Rev. C. S. Tannell, both of Portland, and both members of the committee of this body which investigated his career, and whose report led to the action of our last regular meeting.

Any reputable minister can go back over his career and secure present day statements of standing from any of the state organs where he has worked, or from his former pastors—or at least some of them. If they wish us to reverse our decision it is up to Mr. Payne and the Salem church to produce any of the above credentials."

(The above is printed in order to justify and explain an article heretofore published. It is to be hoped that with this explanation, the controversy, so far as it is carried on in the newspapers, will end.—Ed.)

Witness Saw Murder—Leshar and two companions, William Roban and Mike Garvey, are on trial for the murder of A. V. Miles. The girl witness was Roberta Schirer, who was present during the holdup of Miles' drug store.

On cross examination by defense counsel she said she had identified Leshar by a police photograph as one of the robbers but seeing him in court she felt that the man she saw welding the gun in the store looked more like Hickman than it did like Leshar.

Attorney S. S. Hahn who brought out the testimony began immediately rearranging Leshar's defense.

It seemed a day of reverses for Hickman. This morning his confessed partner in crime, Welby Hunt, 16, pleaded not guilty to the murder of Thoms which made definite his attorney's announcement last night that Hunt would be a state witness against Hickman when the latter's sanity trial begins in January 25.

In the county jail guards reported that Hickman, his face ashen gray and his eyes wide with fear, reeled precipitously from a room where three psychiatrists were examining him to the door of his cell. There he cowered until the steel gate was opened and he rushed inside.

What had caused Hickman to become so frightened was not revealed and the three alienists declined to comment on their findings. The youthful prisoner will
