

Hardy died in surroundings which he, no doubt, would have hosen for his end. The historic countryside of his home was to him the most beloved of spots. More than 40 years ago the novelist planned and built a fine red brick and stone country house which has been his home and sanctum ever since; it was in this home that he produced some of the greatest literature of modern

Whether any of Hardy's recent poetry will ever be given to the public is problematical. Hardy is said to have written it most for himself and his friends, feeling ist had a chill December 12, and that he had completed his life
