

HEATING INDUSTRY HAS OWN ROMANCE

Four years is a small time, in industrial life, yet in this short time an industry has been built up through the genius of two Oregon men which has today international renown, and is one of the largest factors in keeping Oregon industry on the map of this country. Not only is it doing this, but it also is revolutionizing the heating methods of the country, and is providing an outlet for something that used to be a waste product.

About 1910 a partnership was formed in Portland, between J. C. Parker and Harry Banfield. In 1923 this had grown into the ownership of various large industries, chief of which the Iron Fireman plant, in East Portland, was designed to be. In the short time of four years a transcontinental distributing organization was called into being and in 1927 over three and a half million dollars worth of the machines were sold in every state of the Union.

All this was made possible through the merchandizing genius and vision of the late J. C. Parker and his associate Harry Banfield. During the last month of 1927 an airplane accident in Detroit took the life of Mr. Parker and seriously injured Mr. Banfield, who is now recovering at his home in Portland. Fortunately their genius had developed an organization capable of carrying on while Mr. Banfield is recovering, and with him at the helm of affairs, the Iron Fireman factory is destined to become one of Oregon's outstanding industries. In fact right now workmen are busy erecting additional units of buildings which are to take care of the enormous increased demand in the year just beginning.

21 PRISONERS DIG OUT

Only Two Recaptured; Most Head North for Border Line

DETROIT, Jan. 26.—(AP)—The search for 19 of the 21 prisoners who early Tuesday dug their way to freedom out of a branch of

the county jail here in what was described as "the largest wholesale delivery of federal prisoners in the history of the state," assumed international proportions tonight.

Two of the fugitives were recaptured several hours after the escape but authorities were combing Canadian border cities following receipt of information that most of the escaped prisoners planned to cross the Detroit river into Canada in their dash for liberty.

The prisoners, all confined in one cell, dug their way through a

brick wall with crude tools fashioned from a plumbing fixture and flattened buckets. Four prisoners refused to leave the cell.
