VALLEY HAS MILD JANUARY, REVEALED

Freezing Weather Noted On Only Nine Occasions; 25 Lowest Mark

states were experiencing snow storms, blizzards and hurricanes. this protected valley section passed through a comparatively mild January this year, an analysis of the month's weather reports re-

The minimum temperature for the month was 25 degrees above zero, reached on only one day. January 15. The mercury dropped below 32 degrees, or freezing point, on only nine days of the month, most of these being during the cold snap which began January 14 and continued for about a week.

A total of only 4.03 inches of rain fell during the month.

The heaviest rainfall occurred on the second day of the month, with a precipitation of .64 of an inch during that 24 hour period.

The month was ushered in with minimum temperature practically at the freezing point, following the winter's most severe cold snap during the latter part of December. During this cold spell the mercury at one time dropped down to 16 degrees above, the coldest yet recorded this winter.

In comparison with this, Assoclated Press reports indicate that as recently as this week a terrific blizzard swept the entire eastern coast as far south as Florida, average temperature being around zero. Crop damage in one county of Florida alone was estimated at up into the hundreds of thousands

The middle west has also suffered severely during the month just closed, reports of seven deaths from the cold in one day coming from the city of Chicago alone.

At as close a point as Portland there has been a considerable amount of snow and cold weather during the month, due to east winds sweeping down the Columbia river gorge. Lying just west of a mountain range, Salem is protected from storms of this

SCOTLAND ESTATE

Famed British Field Marshal Will Be Given Military

Funeral

LONDON, Jan. 31 .- (AP) .-Field Marshal Earl Haig, at hie own expressed desire, will be buried at Bemersyde, his estate in Scotland, bought for him by a grateful country after the World war. Interment will be preceded by a military funeral, organized by the war office in London and funeral service in Westminster Abbey.

This national tribute will take the form of a solemn Flanders Poppy pageant, typifying the devotion of the field marshal to his comrades of the World war.

It was Lady Haig's wish that ali wreaths and floral tributes should consist of Flanders poppies, the sale of which would swell the funds of the soldier organizations. This request has met with an immediate and large response. Those engaged in making the wreaths will need to work day and night to be in readiness for the funeral. The body will lie in state at St.

Columba's church with which Earl Haig was long connected, under a guard of honor day and night until Friday morning. Then there will be a private requiem in the same church for the family and immediate friends after which the funeral procession will leave the church for Westminster. The route of march will pass Constitution Hill, the Mall, Horseguards' Arch and Whitehall to the abbey. This was the line of march associated for centuries with the country's national life.

HILL PROSECUTION PUSHED WITH VIGOR

OTTAWA, Ill., Jan. 30 .- (AP) A scene in a spooky basement. with the steel spade glistening in the light of an old kerosene lamp as it chipped a grave from hard clay and made tell-tale marks on the shoe that guided it, was reconstructed by the prosecution in its fight to prove Harry Hill shot and killed his mother and buried her body in the cellar of her home at Streator.

The spade, minus a piece of metal which ordinarily would have protected the foot of a digger was described by Sheriff Floyd Clark. A pair of woman's shoes, toes scratched and smeared with clay, were identified by the sheriff as those he saw a deputy pull from a cupboard the night the body of Mrs. Eliza A. Hill was discovered. And, standing beside the woman's shoes, the sheriff testified, were those of a man, clay coated and dented on the instep of the soles.

The state contends the marks were made on Harry's shoes by the unguarded spade blade and that before burying his mother's body he removed her shoes, later placing them with his in the cupboard.


