eld Marshal Haig To Be Highly Honored With **Burial Rites**

LONDON, Feb. 2 .- (AP) .-When the body of Field Marshal Es Haig, who commanded the mighteest army Great Britain ever mustered, is taken to Westminister Abbey on Friday, it will be borne on a historic gun carriage -the cariage of the gun which; fired the first British shell in the great war, and the one that was used at the burial of the "I'n Mown Soldier."

War widows and battle-maimed men trudged in the slow column which moved through St. Columbia's church last night past the field marshal's bier.

All day long and until late at night thousands of men, women and children, filed past the flagdraped coffin, guarded by tall. smartly uniformed soldiers, whose heads were bowed, with hands resting on the hilts of inverted sabers.

Many of the solemn throng which paid farewell homage to the war chief were weeping; many brought bouquets of red poppies - memorials of the terrible, gallant fighting in Flanders and emblem of the beloved field mar shal's tireless efforts to aid the war victims who still survive.

First to come to the church where the dead leader lay, wa-Lady Haig, her face obscured by a heavy veil. For a time she stood alone by the bier of her husband-then scattered popples on the coffin, near the medals the helmet, baton and sword of the marshal.

As she departed the gates opened to admit the first of the long line, in which stood women in rich furs and others in faded cloaks; men in silk hats and others with ragged caps in their

Tomorrow again the public will be permitted to pass the bier and on Friday after a memorial service at St. Columbia's the nation will honor its faithful servant by a funeral at Westminister Abbey. The body will then be taken to Glasgow where it will lie in state from Saturdaay to Monday, before interment-the time has not yet been determined—at the Haig home in Bemersyde, Scotland.
