This piece, with its brilliant technical passages, was played in three tempos. Miss Roberts' technique was at all times adequate and she displayed a remarkable command of her tone.

Miss Mary Jean Porter, harpist, was the assisting artist for the evening. Her first number was "Valse de Concert" (Hasselmann) which she played with a delicate and careful interpretation. The harp seems always to arouse interest in an audience. The beauty of the instrument in conjunction with the skillful touch of Miss Porter proved especially pleasing to the audience last night.
