International interests and affairs will claim the attention of the Oregon division of the American association of university women at the annual meeting in Portland Friday and Saturday, February 10 and 11, it is announced by Miss Moselle Hair, of the extension division of the University of Oregon, who is state president of the organization. All sessions will be held in the Multnomah hotel.

Mrs. Roy Klein, president of the Salem chapter, and others from Salem are expected to attend the session.

Two talks on international topics will be given Friday evening it is stated. The first of these will be given by Mrs. Melvin A. Brannon, director of the north Pacific section of the A. A. U. W. who will talk on "International Interests of the American Association of University Women." Mrs. Brannon has given considerable time to the study of international relations.

"The United States in World Politics: Whether?" will be the subject of G. B. Noble, professor of political science at Reed college. Mr. Noble was a member of the United States Peace Commission in Paris 1918-1919 and is regarded as an authority in this field.
