HEAVY DROP NOTED IN STOCK MARKET

New York Exchange Flooded With Deluge of Selling Orders Friday

NEW YORK, Feb. 17.—(AP)—The stock market broke violently today under a deluge of selling orders which so taxed the facilities of the New York stock exchange that the ticker was 30 minutes late in recording the final quotation. The reaction, which was the most drastic since the one which followed President Coolidge's famous "I do not choose to run" statement last August, carried quoted values of scores of leading issues down \$2 to \$5 a share while a few high priced pool specialties collapsed \$40 to nearly \$20.

The day's sales ran close to 3,000,000 shares, with nearly half of the day's business transacted in his last hour of trading. There were 748 individual issues traded, a new high record for all time.

While there was nothing tangible with which the day's selling could be directly associated, speculative uneasiness over the large volume of brokers' loans, which he well above one billion dollars above the total a year ago, and the recent increase in unemployment were widely mentioned as search factors. Wall street merely regarded it as a "technical reaction" and further evidence of the old adage that "Trees do not grow to heaven."

RECORDS INSPECTED

THROW OPEN ALL BOOKS OF PACIFIC PHONE FIRM

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 16.—(AP)—Books and records of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company, which is seeking rate increases estimated at \$7,000,000 annually, were thrown open to inspection here today to representatives of San Francisco and neighboring communities, which are opposed to the rate raise.

The state railroad commission ruled two weeks ago that the telephone company must submit to the cities' examination all records bearing upon the company's claim that it requires higher telephone rates. The company had opposed vigorously the inspection of its records but Max Thelen, attorney for the company, said it would cooperate fully with the railroad commission's ruling.

That the company is actually a subsidiary of the American Telephone and Telegraph company was the contention of opponents of the raise, who contended that the latter company should be made a party to the hearing.
