HALL OF JUSTICE, Los Angeles, Feb. 21.—(AP)—Science and church joined here in helping weave the web of circumstances which the state is attempting to draw about Dr. Charles M. Mc-Millan, on trial for the murder of Mrs. Amelia Appleby.

The cause of science was represented by R. J. Abernathy, county chemist, who testified that a spot on a lapel of Dr. McMillan's coat was caused by blood. Science also was responsible for the testimony of J. Clark Sellers, handwriting expert, who declared that a purported will or power of attorney leaving all of Mrs. Appleby's fortune to the physician had been written by Dr. McMillan himself.

The church was represented by Rev. Bob Schuler, pastor of the Trinity Methodist Episcopal Rev. Schuler testified that on Christmas night, the night on which a deputy sheriff said Dr. McMillan had declared he attended the church, the pastor did not see the physician in his audience.
