

REED CONTINUING ATTACK ON G. O. P.

Presidential Candidate Explains Stand Before Crowd In Oklahoma

OKLAHOMA CITY, Mar. 12.—(AP)—A new attack on the Harding and Coolidge administrations, Senator Reed of Missouri Saturday answered critics who he said had described him as "too denunciatory" or "destructive."

"Let me inquire of these critics," he declared, "what soft and gentle words should be employed in describing a cabinet officer who accepts a bribe? Shall we refer to him as a 'captain of finance' or as a 'prudent gentleman who made the best of opportunity' or as a 'genius who could hold a public office and thereby enhance his private fortune?'"

Reviewing the leasing of the naval oil reserves by Albert B. Fall as secretary of the interior to whom he referred as a bribe-taker, and the administration of Harry Daugherty as attorney general, the Missouri democratic presidential candidate in his second speech in this state then declared:

"Albert B. Fall is worse than a common thief."

"Harry Daugherty is the vilest insect that ever crawled across the page of time."

"I confess that an evening spent in considering the record made by the present administration must send an audience away with a bad taste in its mouth. It is not surprising therefore that some people say: 'His speech was purely destructive, he gave us nothing constructive.'"

"To these kindly critics I beg to observe that sometimes destruction is synonymous with preservation."

"In the case at hand, he who helps destroy corruption in the body politic, by that act assists in restoring a healthful condition; and he who helps bring about a healthful condition in the body politic is engaged not in destruction but in restoration and is in the highest sense of the word constructive."

Denouncing the expansion of federal power and authority "at the expense of state and local self government," Senator Reed did call upon the national government to quit "finkering" with the program of making streams navigable and to launch upon a vast plan of internal improvements.

"Some of us have contended," he said, "not recently but throughout the years that the organization of the government did not end with transforming of navigable rivers into great streams and to protect inundation and destruction the vast domain which is now subjected to devastating floods."

BACK WALSH MOVE

CAMPAIGN IN CALIFORNIA TAKES ON ACTIVITY

SAN FRANCISCO, Mar. 12.—(AP)—A campaign to secure the California delegation to the national democratic convention at Houston for United States Senator Thomas J. Walsh of Montana has been launched here.

A list of candidates for delegates favorable to Senator Walsh headed by William G. McAdoo of Los Angeles, secretary of the treasury under President Wilson, was announced by J. O. Davis, chairman of the Northern California campaign committee.

This list includes besides Mr. McAdoo the names of Kathleen Norris, the writer, and George Creel, who directed the government's war time information bureau.

There are two candidates from each of the 11 congressional districts and eight at large. As California will have only 26 votes in the convention each of the delegates from the congressional districts would have one vote and each of the delegates at large would have half a vote.

Further Announcement of W.C.T.U. Drive Made

EVANSTON, Ill., Mar. 12.—(AP)—A nation-wide educational campaign against alcoholism has been planned by the National Woman's Christian Temperance Union which seeks to gain the cooperation of public health officials.

Every state W. C. T. U. has been asked to begin the drive March 20, national headquarters here announced today.

Statements and figures on the death rates from alcoholism have been distributed by the national organization. The figures were prepared under direction of Miss Cora Frances Stoddard, director of scientific temperance investigation for the union.

"Deaths from alcoholism in the United States, while lower than they were prior to prohibition are higher than they should be. Some one is responsible," Miss Stoddard said. High peaks in alcoholism death rates now occur only in wet cities and wet states. As a national matter alcoholism as a cause of death is lower than it was in pre-prohibition era.



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PRESIDENT OF CHAIN STORES PASSES ON

Rodman Wanamaker Dies Suddenly In Atlantic City Yesterday

JENKINTON, Pa., Mar. 12.—(AP)—Rodman Wanamaker, last surviving son of the late John Wanamaker and head of the stores in Philadelphia, New York and abroad that bear the family name, died in Atlantic City early today.

Mr. Wanamaker went to his seashore home about four weeks ago and later contracted a cold. He apparently was improving until about a week ago when complications set in. His condition however, did not become alarming until Thursday when there was evidence of uremia and he passed into a state of coma. He was 65 years old.

Three leading physicians from Philadelphia were summoned to his bedside for consultation yesterday.

Mr. Wanamaker was interested in many enterprises of a civic and philanthropic nature, not only here and in New York but abroad as well. He was a generous patron of art and had many examples of the work of great painters and other artists in the New York and Philadelphia stores. He had given lavishly of his wealth to further aviation. He financed the airship America which was wrecked in a storm in 1914 when it attempted a trans-Atlantic flight. Byrd's aerial flight to the North Pole and his later hop to France were made possible by Mr. Wanamaker's backing.
