One large man, 300 or over, frequently arrived late at his seat in the senate. He had several forensic tilts with Joseph and to get even the latter framed an entertainment for the proprietor of the state house shoe-shining stand, a well known colored man, Charles Maxwell, weighing 345 pounds, to occupy the senator's seat near the front row, properly dressed in senatorial togs. Arriving late one morning to find the colored giant occupying his seat, the colored man was slow to give up the chair and desk. Asked to vacate he declined and said politely that the seat was intended for the largest man in the legislature.
