ENROLLMENT GROWS

TOTAL IN SALEM SCHOOLS 5,364, REPORT SHOWS

Attendance in the city schools for the month ending March 18 reached 5,364, according to figures compiled yesterday at the office of the superintendent. Enrollment for the month just closed was 58 more than in February, when 5,306 were in attendance, and 271 more than for the period ending March 18, 1927, when attendance was recorded at 5,035.

Figures for the various schools for the month: high school, 1199; Parrieh junior high, 949; Leslie junior high, 497; Englewood, 346; Garfield, 400; Grant, 314; Highland, 356; McKinley, 266; Park, 350; Lincoln, 180; Richmond, 290; Washington, 217.
