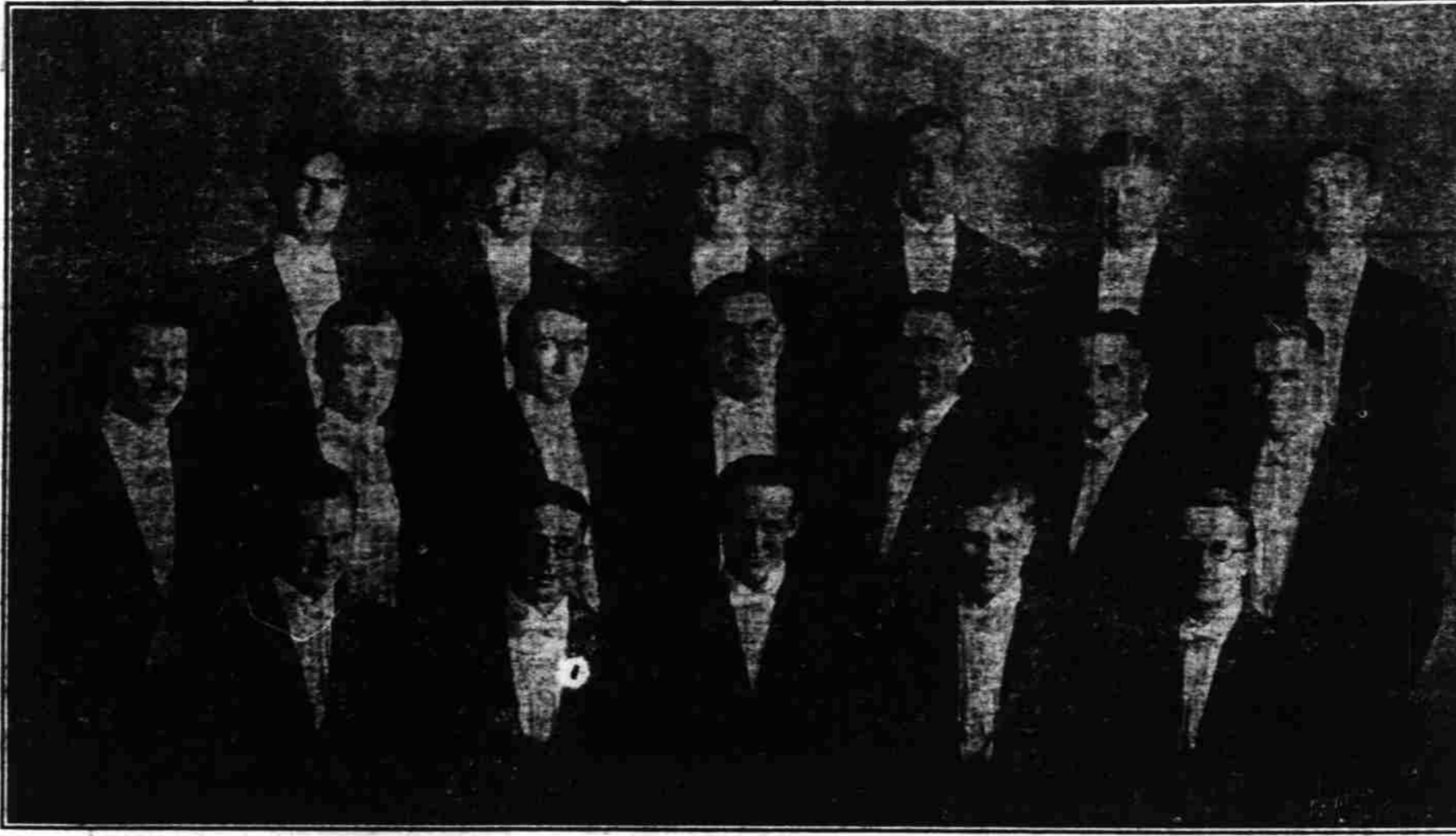


W. U. MEN'S GLEE CLUB HOME CONCERT TUESDAY NIGHT AT ELSINORE

PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION FOR SECRETARY

H. H. Corey, member of the Oregon public service commission, Saturday filed his declaration of candidacy for the office of secretary of state. Mr. Corey is a republican.

His slogan reads: "Conduct the office so as to merit the same public approval and indorsement of the press that has characterized my public service in the past."

Franklin Frederick Korell, 795 Kearney street, Portland, Saturday filed with the secretary of state here his declaration of candidacy for re-election to the office of representative in congress for the third congressional district, comprising Multnomah county. Mr. Korell is a republican.

"Continue aggressive representation of Oregon, its people and welfare," is the slogan adopted by Mr. Korell.

Joseph K. Carson, Jr., 365 Hemlock street, Portland, has filed for election as a delegate to the democratic national convention from the third congressional district. "I favor Governor Alfred E. Smith for president of the United

States," is the slogan on which Mr. Smith will conduct his campaign.

W. H. Canon, Medford, also would attend the democratic national convention. He would represent the first congressional district. He has requested that the following slogan be printed after his name on the official ballot: "Al Smith is my choice for president."

William E. Coleman of Myrtle Point, has filed for the democratic nomination for district attorney for Coos county.

Daniel J. Fry of Salem seeks to attend the democratic national convention as a delegate from the first congressional district. He favors Alfred E. Smith for president.

James H. E. Scott of Milton, republican, has filed for representative in the legislature for the 23rd representative district, comprising Umatilla county.

O. O. Jetley of Burns would serve as representative in the legislature for the 27th representa-

tive district, comprising Grant and Harney counties. He is a republican.

A. F. Lacy of Pine Grove has filed for the republican nomination for district attorney of Hood River county.

Perrydale Movie Center: Three Shows In One Week

PERRYDALE, Mar. 24.—(Special)—The little town of Perrydale in the extreme northern part of Polk county, which has been in the past so far removed from city highlights, suddenly entered the "movie" class with a zest.

FIND PLANE WHEEL

DISCOVERY MADE IN MISSISSIPPI SOUND FRIDAY

MOBILE, Ala., Mar. 24.—(AP)—An airplane wheel and tire, found by fishermen off Horn island in Mississippi sound and first believed to have been from the monoplane in which Paul Redfern disappeared last summer while attempting a non stop flight to Brazil, proved today to have been part of an old type plane.

The fishermen picked up the wheel while placing their nets on the Gulf of Mexico side of the island March 21. The wheel, apparently of steel construction was so salt eaten that it crumbled in their hands but today the crew came into port to bring the tire which was well preserved.

Paul Redfern, Georgia aviator, disappeared after taking off from Brunswick, Ga., last August 25 on a projected non-stop flight to Brazil.

He was seen only once following the take-off. That was the afternoon of the next day when he circled over a ship in the Caribbean sea and dropped notes to get information as to his bearings.

Redfern flew alone in a Stinson-Detroit monoplane, especially designed for the flight and had no radio equipment.
