

ANOTHER WITNESS WILL BE ARRESTED

Senate Issues Formal Warrant in Case of Thomas W. Cunningham

WASHINGTON, Mar. 24.—(AP)—The senate today issued its warrant for the arrest of another witness before one of its committees, Thomas W. Cunningham, of Philadelphia, long prominent in the political organization built up by Senator-elect William S. Vare of Pennsylvania.

Immediately after the senate acted—and there was no opposition to the adoption of the resolution of arrest—John McGrain, a deputy sergeant at arms, left for Philadelphia to serve the warrant on Cunningham, who is sheriff of Philadelphia county and treasurer of the Pennsylvania state republican committee.

ALBERT FALL WILL GIVE DEPOSITION

Order Secured By Harry Sinclair with View To Obtaining Evidence

WASHINGTON, Mar. 24.—(AP)—Deprived of the testimony of Albert B. Fall, because of his illness, Harry F. Sinclair today obtained an order from Justice Jennings, Bailey in District of Columbia supreme court permitting him to take the oral deposition of the former interior secretary to be used in Sinclair's defense against charges of conspiring with Fall to defraud the government in the Teapot Dome lease.

The deposition will be taken at Fall's home in El Paso, Texas, on March 29 by Daniel Thew Wright, who recently came into the case as associate counsel for Sinclair. The court order appointed M. B. Bull, a notary public at El Paso as the commissioner to take the testimony and provide that only three days notice of the intention of the defense need be given the special government prosecutors.

At the deposition will be taken before only representatives of the defense and prosecutors, George P. Hoover, counsel for Sinclair said, and will not become public until read in court here. Wright will depart for El Paso tomorrow night.

Sinclair sought the court order to enable him to get the story of the Teapot Dome lease from Fall on the grounds that it could not be properly brought out by written questions.

STOCK MART SEAT PRICES GOING UP

Advance To \$350,000, Making Rise of \$10,000; Sales High

NEW YORK, March 24.—(AP)—Prices of memberships on the New York stock exchange advanced \$10,000 to a new high record of \$350,000, as total sales crossed the 2,000,000 share mark for the third consecutive Saturday.

Heavy profit taking sales checked the rising tide of stock prices but not until after General Motors had moved up \$4.75 a share to another new high record at \$192, closing \$2 a share below that level. General Motors has added approximately \$925,000,000 to the market value of its 17,400,000 shares of common stock outstanding since the present "boom" started three weeks ago.

The averages of 20 leading industrial shares, compiled by the Associated Press, showed small net declines.

At their high price of \$350,000 established today, stock exchange seats were selling \$60,000 above the year's low level and just double the price of a year ago. Membership in the exchange is limited to 1100 but only about half of the members appear on the floor daily. Membership on the New York produce exchange, which is expected to start an unlisted securities department this summer rose to a new high level at \$14,500 today.

ASK MORE MIRRORS FOR WOMEN M.P.'S

Eight Feminine Members of Parliament Need Nine Glasses, Claim

LONDON, Mar. 24.—(AP)—One lone mirror is not enough for the eight women members of parliament, says Ellen Wilkinson, who proposes to bring the matter to the attention of the commons. There should be at least nine mirrors. Miss Wilkinson contends, the extra one for emergencies.

The lone mirror has been doing duty in the women's boudoir ever since Lady Astor took her seat in parliament. Before that it was in one of the men's smoke rooms the women say it is a real old fashioned affair and today, with eight women members, is sadly overworked.

Both Lady Astor and Miss Wilkinson, backed by five other women members, have been clamoring for months for better accommodations, and now they have reinforcements in Mrs. Walter P. Reuther elected to parliament a few months ago. Among other things they want the nearby quarter on bridge—where the laborites as a rule smoke. The laborites, however, have given notice that they will oppose the idea of evicting tooth and nail unless an equally large smoke room is found for them elsewhere.

The women also have their eye on two other rooms used by the conservatives and liberals. The conservatives, hoping to stave off an invasion of their particular room, have offered to buy three brand new mirrors for the women's present boudoir.
