Child Study Classes of A. A. U. W. Will Have Open Meeting

A joint meeting of the child study classes of the American Association of University Women will be held at seven-thirty o'clock this evening on the tenth floor of the United States National Bank building.

The feature of the meeting will be the review of Dr. Douglas A. Thoms' recent book "Everyday Problems of the Everyday Child," which will be given by Mrs. Crawford-Newcomb.

Among the projects which the foundation has sponsored are the organization of an institute of medical research which has solved some of the greatest health problems of the south; the establishment of the animal farm at Princeton for the study of the diseases of animals used for food; and the solving of the boll-weevil problem of the south.

In Oregon, the Rockefeller foundation has given the sum of \$300,000 to the Oregon Medical school and also given Reed College one-third of the endowment of \$400,000.
